After an absence of several weeks burlesque returned to the Odeon again Tuesday night for probably the last time this season. "The Winners" was the attraction, headed by Moore and Scanlon, comedians, and Arnold and Sam Field, dancers. The show was staged along the usual lines of burlesque, with songs, dances and jokes making up the main portion of the two acts. Evidently endeavoring to make up for the interval that had elapsed since a burlesque show visited this city, the comedians "cracked" several jokes that were plainly suggestive, and intended for no other purpose. Aside from this the chorus, singing and dancing was good. Field brothers presented dances that were especially clever, their "staircase dance," with Martha Edmonds, proving a pleasing novelty. In the end the play goes forth to lives of new usefulness, supposedly as sowers of a seed to be reaped and enjoyed by future generations. Miss Sweet's acting in her part of bearing up under defeated love is as good as she has done for some time. She is both sad and joyful, portraying both emotions in a convincing manner that is realistic. As the princess Mabel Van Buren carries her role well, and the male characters are up to the standard. The splendor of the Russian court is well portrayed in the scenic settings. At the Casino.
