



Cedar Rapids Here Saturday and Sunday, and Leander Clark College Monday—Fort Dodge Comes Next Week—First Player Released—Other Prospects Fighting For Places.

The Ansons will be busy practically all the time until the opening of the championship season, if the weather man will only be good. Games have been scheduled for every day up to and including May 1. The schedule has been completed by contracting for two games with the Leander Clark College team, one to be played here on Monday, April 24, and the other at Toledo the following day. FIRST PLAYER RELEASED.

Ellerman's Defective Eyesight Results in Quick Dismissal From Squad. The ax fell for the first time last night. Ellerman, the pitcher who wears "specs," was the first member of the Anson squad to be divorced from his job, drawing his release at the close of practice Thursday. Ellerman's defective eyesight was the cause of his downfall.

When the studious looking recruit took the mound yesterday, and the members of the squad began to drive the ball straight back at the pitcher, Manager Boyle feared for the safety of the youth and called him out. Ellerman persists in wearing his "specs" in the box and is unable to follow a hot drive with his eyes. As a consequence several hard hit balls came near denting his anatomy and the lad was in constant danger of being seriously hurt or killed.

Ellerman still maintains he "has more stuff" than any pitcher on the squad, but he is not going to remain here to prove it.

Hickman, the ex-Fed. pitcher, who has been detained from reporting because of the mental illness of his brother, is the only man who has not reported to Manager Boyle. It is not known just when Hickman can leave his brother's bedside.

Eunick, "the Oklahoma kid," was the center of attraction in Wednesday workout. His sharp fielding and sowed throwing arm has made him a favorite and it is apparent that he is the best third sacker seen locally since the days of Clyde Williams and Joe Benz.

Blank, who has been given a trial at shortstop, is playing the position like a veteran, and will give battle to all comers for a berth. Ryan has taken his old place at second, and apparently intends to retain the position another season. "Any one that wants my job will have to play a while of a game to pry me off that bag," is the manner in which Ryan sums up the situation.

Sears declares that the outfield competition is so spirited that he has seriously considered slipping a sleeping potion into the coffee of one of the other candidates to insure him a berth. The Georgian, however, seems to have about as firm a grip on the outfield as his competitors, and the selection of three regulars may not be made until game time on May 2.
