AMUSEMENTS.
At the Strand.
There is plenty of hot-blooded Mexican romance in "The Heart of Paula," shown at the Strand Sunday evening to good-sized audiences. Leonore Ulrich takes the part of Paula, and displays some very good emotional acting, also overdoing it in one or two places.
A substitution of an unattractive man for a character one cannot trouble to begin with, Stephen Pachman, a mining engineer, receives a commission to examine a mine in Mexico, but his wife is apprehensive as to his safety and persuades her brother, Bruce McLean, to change places with her husband, not telling of the change. So when Bruce arrives in Mexico he falls in love with Paula, a Spanish girl, and is captured by Pacheco, a guerrilla leader, who also loves Paula. Bruce's sister comes from the states. Paula thinks she is Bruce's wife and becomes jealous of the other man. Pacheco escapes and captures, and in the end things are straightened out satisfactorily. The scenes, laid in Mexico, are of timely interest, and well produced. Burton Holmes has some striking pictures of western forest fires.
At the Lyric.
House Peters appeared on the screen at the Lyric Sunday night in "The Hand of Peril," a detective thriller witnessed by two large audiences. Peters takes the part of James Keatner, a government secret service man who is on the trail of a gang of counterfeiters, and finally captures them. Fred Lambert, an unusually clever crook. There are many desperate battles of wits and brute strength, and eventually Lambert is captured by the secret service man, but not before he has fallen in love with Lambert's daughter, Maura. The scenic effects thruout the production are especially well arranged, one novel feature being the showing of nine completely furnished rooms in one set, with action in each room, and all produced on the screen at the same time.
At the Casino.
Beaule Barriscale, long a favorite on the legitimate stage, takes the leading role in "The Green Swamp," screened at the Casino Sunday night before good-sized audiences. It is a story of a wife's unquenchable jealousy for her husband, and the mental anguish she undergoes needlessly, because she suspects him of all sorts of things which he does not do. Bruce McRae is the husband, playing the part of Dr. Ward Allison. Mrs. Barriscale presents some good emotional acting and there are several excellent scenic effects, among them being a masked ball and a scene in an operating room in a hospital.
Allison's wife is constantly suspecting him of leading a double life, and expects him to desert her. In the end she discovers that all her fears were groundless, and happiness is achieved.
Fred Mace in "Crooked to the End," is the comedy, which has been here before.
At the Colonial.
Some of the best and most natural war pictures yet exhibited here were shown at the Colonial Sunday evening under the title of "Fighting For France." Action abounds thruout the film, and besides interesting scenes on the firing line, many pictures are shown of activities in the rear, including George V. of England, President Poincare, of France, General Joffre, Kitchener, and several thousand troops. The films are clear and give an excellent idea of the general trend of the war, presented from a French viewpoint.

ORDER SIDEWALKS IN
Council Orders About 10,000 Lineal Feet of Walks Laid—Let Grading Contract For 20 Cents Per Cubic Yard.
The city council ordered in about 10,000 lineal feet of sidewalks and let a grading contract for an estimated 14,000 cubic yards of earth at its meeting Monday forenoon. The sidewalks ordered in comprise a long list of parts of streets from all wards of the city, along both property that is close in and outlying as well.
The grading contract was let to John Herbert & Sons for 20 cents a cubic yard. There were only two bidders. The other was Agolph Carlson, who bid 24 cents. Herbert & Sons' bid covers also all grubbing of trees necessary.
This contract is for grading West Main street from Thirteenth street to the city limits, and on the south side of Main street, Nevada street from Ninth street west, Tenth street from Boone to Nevada, Fremont from Seventh to Eighth and from Ninth to Tenth, Eighth from State to Jerome, Summit from Seventh to Eighth, and the grading on the south side of West Main street west of Thirteenth for a sidewalk that is to be built well toward the city limits.
A small contract for grading South Ninth street, south of Doty street, was let by Councilman Austin to W. L. Carhuft for 15 cents a yard. This contract is in fulfillment of the city's agreement in the settlement of the water damage cases from that part of the city.
The council settled for \$262.50 the claim of Carl Pfeiffer, an M. & St. L. employe, who was injured when crushed against a city light department's pole in the M. & St. L. yards. The railroad settled the claim and asked to be reimbursed by the city for the amount.
