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FOUR HELD TO JURY

Carl Sawin and "Jim" Weaver, Charged With Liquor Nuisance, Plead Guilty—Two Others Held to Jury—Tim Burke is Released.

Four of the five arrested by the police Thursday night for liquor nuisance and bootlegging were held to the federal grand jury by Commissioner Fitzsimmons Friday afternoon in Des Moines.

One, Tim Burke, a plumber, 602 South Eighth avenue, was discharged for lack of evidence.

Those held to the grand jury were Carl Sawin, "soft drink" parlor proprietor 234 East Main street; "Jim" Weaver, ex-railroad employe; Mrs. May Condon, 413 East Nevada street; and Henry Solomon, 402 May street.

Sawin and Weaver pleaded guilty. In default of \$300 bail in both cases, both were held in the Polk county jail to await the meeting of the grand jury which will be Tuesday, May 2.

Mrs. Condon and Solomon both pleaded not guilty, but were held to the grand jury under bail. Solomon posted a bond for \$300. Mrs. Condon is under bail here, and was released with it as her security.
