SERUM SPOILS HAMS

MEAT INSPECTORS COMPLAIN OF METHODS EMPLOYED IN HOG VACCINATION.

HAVE DIFFICULTY IN GETTING GOOD HAMS

Request That Veterinarians Make Injection in Axillary Space Where Leg Joins Body of Hog—This Method Is Quite as Effective and Does Not Spoil Hams For Treatment.

Des Moines, May 12.—Meat inspectors at the big packing houses are sending complaints to the state veterinarian that the practice of injecting serum for hog cholera prevention into the hams of the hogs is injuring the hams seriously for meat purposes.

The government veterinarian stationed in Dallas county, Dr. Koen, will request the railroads having stock yards in Dallas county and in the towns adjacent to that county to clean them up thoroughly and then he will disinfect them.

Hog Cholera On Decline. There is not much hog cholera in the state now as compared to previous years, the state veterinarian's office reports.

IOWA FARM NEWS AND NOTES

Co-operative Live Stock Shipping Associations Increasingly Popular

Farmers' live stock shipping associations have proved so successful that, although the first was not formed until 1908, the department of agriculture now has a list of approximately 150 that are shipping stock in a co-operative way.

The main purpose of these associations is to enable their members to ship in carload lots to the central markets instead of being more or less at the mercy of local buyers in disposing of a few animals from time to time.

The fact that no capital is required for the organization of such an association is a new publication of the department, Farmers' Bulletin 718, which deals with this subject, makes these associations possible in communities in which more complicated forms of co-operation would not succeed.

The bulletin, however, points out that such associations are scarcely practicable in regions where there is so much live stock that it is generally marketed in carload lots under any circumstances or where there is so little that the association has practically nothing with which to work.

To organize such an association it is necessary only for the farmers of the community to meet together, adopt a simple constitution and by-laws, a sample of which is given in the bulletin already mentioned.

In order to avoid misunderstanding, it is important that all stock be marked at the shipping point. This precaution prevents disputes in making and docking and assists in making adjustments in case of loss or damage in transit.

Since no payments are made for stock shipped until returns from the central market are obtained, these co-operative associations may be formed without capital. At the same time, it is for the farmers to comply with their engagement to furnish the stock to the manager when, where, and in such quantities as they say they will.

CHOLERA SERUM ON HAND.

College Well Stocked Against Any Possible Outbreak.

"We have on hand a sufficient supply of hog cholera serum to promptly fill all orders," says H. E. Bemis, acting director of the veterinary laboratory at Iowa State College.

No serum is sent out without being carefully tested for potency and purity. The serum sells for 1 1/2 cents per cubic centimeter and will be shipped either to the veterinarian or owner of the herd.

GROW SUMMER SOILING CROPS.

Even Farmer With Summer Silo Can Not Afford Not to Grow Them.

Soiling crops mean increased summer milk production. "No farmer who pretends to own a dairy herd can afford not to grow them," says C. A. Nelson, Iowa farmer, breeder of a herd of over seventy-five pure bred Holsteins and recognized as one of the most successful dairy men in the country.

"Even the farmer with a summer silo needs to plant soiling crops if he wants his cows to produce the goods in the summer time," he says. "They reduce the acreage for pasture; they provide succulent feed all summer which pastures as a rule do not, and they mean increased production at decreased cost."

New and Succulent Pasture Apt to Cause Disease Among Cattle

Cattle are very likely to bloat when pastured on alfalfa, say the farm crops men at Iowa State College. It may also occur when pasturing on succulent red or white clover.

The Man, Not the Land.

"The greatest factor in farming is not the land but the man on the land," says C. F. Curtis, dean of agriculture at Iowa State College. He has just completed a report comparing last year's farming records of the Iowa State college graduates who are operating farms with the records of the state.

This increase does not fully represent the advantage of college training on the farm, points out Dean Curtis. "Over one-half of these graduates are breeders of one or more breeds of purebred live stock and all are producing products of highest excellence."
