DANGER IN HAMBURGER.

Dairy and Food Department Find Preservatives in Meat. Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, May 17.—The state dairy and food commission has recently examined several samples of hamburger steak which were found to be preserved with sulphite of soda. The sale of articles of food preserved with sulphites is not only a violation of the food law, but an actual menace to health of the consumer. The use of preservatives in the preparation of hamburger steak, etc., is entirely uncalculated. No intelligent butcher, who uses sound wholesome meat in the preparation of such meat products and keeps his wares stored in the ice box or refrigerator case, will add a preservative. It is only the unscrupulous dealer, who grinds meat of a questionable character and displays the product on a warm counter, that will use sulphites. State Dairy and Food Commissioner Barney has instructed his inspectors to prosecute all cases arising from the use of dangerous preservatives in meat products and will insist on a

maximum fine for those violating the law in this respect. It is recommended that housewives look with suspicion upon hamburger steak displayed on a warm counter and hamburger having an excessively bright red-color. As the warm weather appears, it is necessary to handle food products with greater care. Unscrupulous dealers are tempted to resort to preservatives.

WILL PAY \$1,000 FOR SON'S BODY.

Father of Lavern Chapman, S. U. 1. Student, Offers Substantial Reward. Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, May 17.—A reward of \$1,000 will be paid to the man who recovers the body of Lavern Chapman, the Waterloo student, who was drowned in the Iowa river at Coralville, when his canoe was swamped at the dam. The father of the ill-fated youth, Frank W. Chapman, a prominent contractor of Waterloo, who was here aiding in the futile efforts of the searching party to recover the lifeless form, made the offer. Humanity was stimulated last night by the material inducement of a higher foundation, and renewed activities at the dam resulted, but all labor has been in vain to the present time. Dynamite may be used today to destroy the submerged rocks, near the dam, as the body may be lodged among these rocks, or caught on some sharp ledge.
