

MANUFACTURERS IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

MARSHALLTOWN ENTERTAINS MEN WHO HAVE FACTORIES ALL OVER IOWA.

RAILROAD MEN HERE IN LARGE NUMBERS AS WELL

Representatives of State Factories and Various Rail Lines Will Mingle Today and Thursday—Elaborate Program Planned For Both Delegations—Banquet Tonight.

Marshalltown swarmed with manufacturers and railroad men today, with the opening of the fourteenth annual convention of the Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, and the added feature of railroad and traffic men from all parts of the country. Special cars arrived on various incoming trains this morning, and two special trains were scheduled to arrive late in the day, bringing railroad officials from Minneapolis and Des Moines.

One hundred thirty-five manufacturers and seventy-five railroad men had registered at Cronkleton hall and the Marshalltown club respectively, up to noon today, and more were expected on the afternoon and evening trains.

Towns Send Special Groups. Various cities throughout the state competing for the convention next year sent special cars, with their delegations, to Marshalltown. Burlington and Des Moines delegations arrived in cars set aside for them this forenoon. About twenty men were here from the first two cities, and many more from Des Moines. Ten came from Waterloo. These four cities, and one or two others as yet not reported, are all bidding for the 1917 convention.

George E. Hamilton, associate secretary of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, headed the Des Moines delegation, which is bending every effort to land next year's meeting. By night Mr. Hamilton estimated the Des Moines delegation would number fifty. R. H. Paxon, general secretary of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, arrived this afternoon.

The state manufacturers organized in Des Moines thirteen years ago, and as Des Moines has not entertained the convention since its organization meeting, it thinks the time now ripe for the convention to return to its birthplace.

Mr. Hamilton, whose work is largely the securing of conventions and seeing that they are entertained in the city. He traveled for sixteen years for the St. Louis Heavy Hardware Company, and made Marshalltown once every three weeks during that period.

Manufacturers Convene. Over 100 manufacturers met at Cronkleton hall at 10 o'clock this forenoon for the first business session of the convention. Following the address of welcome by Mayor I. S. Millard, and a response of F. L. Northey, of Waterloo, General Secretary George Wrightman, of Des Moines, read several letters from manufacturers' associations in other states, sending greetings to the Iowa men. President J. W. Hill, of Des Moines, gave his annual address, and the remainder of the morning was taken up with reports of

charge of A. A. Moore, met delegates and visitors at the stations this morning and conveyed them either to Cronkleton hall or the Marshalltown Club. At the latter place they were assigned rooms. The railroad men were taken on an auto ride about the city this forenoon, while visiting ladies were entertained at 10 o'clock by the local ladies' reception committee at the Y. W. C. A. rooms.

President Samuel N. Felton, of the Chicago Great Western, went through the city this forenoon on his way to Des Moines, and will return late this afternoon on a special train for the banquet this evening, at which he is scheduled to speak. Vice President and General Manager C. W. Huntington and Traffic Manager F. B. Townsend, of the M. & St. L., arrived on a special train at noon. General Traffic Manager S. G. Lutz, of the Chicago & Alton, accompanied by his wife and daughter, Jeanette, arrived from Chicago in his private car on the Northwestern this morning. Other officials who are in the city include M. J. Golden and M. R. Leahy, of Chicago, assistant general freight and passenger agents of the Northwestern; Henry Cook, general agent for the M. & St. L. at St. Louis; and F. H. Law, of St. Louis, general freight agent of the Illinois Central.

Ambulance and Hearse For Ball Game. This afternoon the railroad men assembled at the Marshalltown Club and played the ball game, where a ball game was scheduled between two picked teams of railroad men bearing the novel cognomens of "Beebees" and "Jovly Domes."

Elaborate preparations had been made by Chairman E. H. Draper for every possible convenience for the ball players. When the parade of thirty-four automobiles started for the ball grounds at 2:30 several starting features were noticeable which bespoke a fierce and bloody combat between the rival ball teams. A sombre black hearse ambled slowly along among the automobiles, and a gray ambulance was followed by two auto loads of white capped nurses and some of the city's doctors, with surgical cases ready for all emergencies. The ball players followed, as well as autos carrying the visiting ladies, and many more machines.

All Guests at Banquet Tonight. At 7 o'clock tonight railroad men and manufacturers will all meet at the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium for the banquet given by the Marshalltown Club, at which the visitors will be guests. D. W. Norris will act as toastmaster, and E. N. Hurley, of Washington, D. C., vice chairman of the federal trade commission, will be the principal speaker. At the same time the ladies will be entertained at dinner at the L. R. Willard home.

Field Meet Thursday Morning. Railroad men will participate in a "field meet" and fishing contest at Riverview park Thursday morning. A

detailed program, written in railroad style, has been given out, and all rules must be strictly adhered to. Twenty dollars in cash will be given to the first person catching a fish in the Iowa river.

An "obstacle race" will be the principal part of the field meet, with six stops. The railroad men will be required to pick up peanuts and light cigars in certain detailed ways that must be done according to instructions. The visiting ladies will be taken on an automobile ride about the city during the forenoon, and will be spectators at the field meet.

Manufacturers and railroad men will be given an opportunity to visit between sessions. If the manufacturers complete their business Thursday afternoon they will attend the Marshalltown-Waterloo ball game, as will also the railroad men. Visiting ladies will be admitted to the game free on presentation of their badge. The convention will close Thursday afternoon.
