Lynch and carried, the bond of the County Engineer H. O. Hickok was approved. W. A. Nichols moved the adoption of the following resolution and was seconded by W. H. Jones and carried. Resolution. Whereas, On April 26, 1915, a contract was entered into between Marshall county, Iowa, and Cole Brothers of Ames, Iowa, for various items of bridge and culvert work, and Whereas, Cole Brothers prosecuted this contract with all due diligence and would have completed same satisfactorily had not they, at the request of Marshall county, built a number of extra bridges and culverts by private contract at the same rate governing the original contract, and Whereas, the re-inforcing steel and cement bought for the bridges and culverts included in original contract was used up in completing the extra work, leaving nine culverts of the original contract uncompleted, and Whereas, the price of these commodities has greatly increased over the prices obtained last year, therefore, It is the sense of the board of supervisors that it would be a gross injustice to force Cole Brothers to build these nine remaining jobs at the original contract price, therefore Be it, and it hereby is Resolved, That the portion of the contract covering the nine jobs between Cole Brothers and Marshall county be, and hereby is, annulled, and Cole Brothers are hereby released from any obligation whatsoever in connection with the construction of these nine culverts. Ad Club Has Interesting Film. Strand on Paper Manufacture. Local people who have become interested in the move for the conservation of waste paper had an opportunity to see what becomes of the paper when a film, showing the manufacture of paper from the first stages to the finished product, was shown at the Strand at 12:30 today. The Marshalltown Ad Club secured the film for exhibition here. It is put out by a Chicago paper manufacturing concern. About forty people were present for the exhibition. Pictures were shown of waste paper and rags being brought in and made into pulp, and the process of manufacture was then followed in interesting detail up to the finished product. In addition the printing plant of a large Chicago mail order house was shown with presses at work printing catalogs. The film is sent around free of charge, and Manager W. D. Scarcity of vessels is seriously hindering American manufacturers in their efforts to get logwood supplies, department of commerce officials say. Flats at Santo Domingo are reported filled with shipments. The heavy American demand has forced prices up 100 per cent and freight rates to New York have increased several hundred per cent. A solid stand of 25,000 acres of logwood has just been discovered in Honduras and will soon be put on the market, the department has learned. Another newly discovered supply is reported from Mantanzas province, Cuba.
