## SPEAKERS NAMED FOR G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT

LOCAL COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES PROGRAM FOR TWO EVENING SESSIONS OF VETERANS.

INCLUDES GOVERNOR AND G. A. R. HEAD

Governor Clarke Will Deliver Speech on the Part of Iowa—Commander Montfort to Give Formal Welcome to Old Soldiers—Former Grand Commander Palmer Will Also Speak.

Announcement of the official program of speakers for the state encampment of the G. A. R. taking in the two evening sessions to be held Tuesday and Wednesday, June 20 and 21, was made today by Merritt Greene, J. B. Classen, J. Z. Benson, J. A. Bacher, and J. B. Northcott, the Marshalltown club's committee appointed for that purpose.

Governor George W. Clarke, Elias R. Montfort, of Cincinnati, grand commander of the G. A. R.; Dr. Charles W. Flint, of Cornell College, Mount Vernon, and Laurence C. Jones, of Braxton, Miss., are to be the principal speakers.

**Governor Speaks Tuesday.**  
The first formal program of the encampment will be held Tuesday evening, June 21, at 8 o'clock, probably at the Methodist church. J. B. Classen Merritt Greene will act as chairman. The drum corps from the Kinsman post, Des Moines, will play, and the invocation will be given by Rev. H. O. Pratt. After the singing of "America" Mayor J. S. Millard will give the address of welcome in behalf of the city, and Governor Clarke will speak for the state. The response on the part of the Grand Army will be made by Col. J. M. Parker, of this city. Miss Patience Wallace will give a reading and the main address of welcome to the delegates and visitors will then be given by Grand Commander Elias R. Montfort, of Cincinnati. Rev. W. S. Knight, of Des Moines, will also give an address.

**Dinner at Home Wednesday.**  
Business sessions will be held during the day by the G. A. R. W. R. C., Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Sons of Veterans. On Wednesday at noon the visiting old soldiers will take dinner at the soldiers' home as guests of the state. Tickets will be obtained at the place of registration.

Wednesday evening the second and final evening session will be held at the Methodist church. This will be a campfire meeting, and will be presided over by C. H. E. Boardman. After the opening exercises, ten-minute speeches will be made by Col. David Palmer, of Washington, Iowa, former grand commander; Judge J. W. Willett, of Tama; Lot Abraham, of Mount Pleasant; R. F. St. John, Riceville; M. McDonald, Guthrie Center; J. F. Merry, Manchester, department commander of the G. A. R.; Mrs. Lu L. Schreck, Parkersburg, department president of the W. R. C.; Mrs. Lillian Clark Carey, Dubuque, department president of the Ladies of the G. A. R.; and W. L. Kerr, of Fort Dodge, commander of the Iowa Division of the Sons of Veterans.

**Address by Dr. Flint.**  
An address will also be given by Dr. Charles W. Flint, of Cornell College, Mount Vernon, and a tribute to the union soldiers by Laurence C. Jones, colored, formerly of this city, but now head of the Piney Woods school at Braxton, Miss.

The encampment will close Thursday afternoon with a parade in which all visitors, delegates, and local members of the various organizations will participate.

### SCHOOL CASE IS BEGUN.

Marietta "Square" Controversy Begun Before Judge Willett.

Factional matters that have quarreled and become involved in a controversy over the ownership and possession of the village "square," became arrayed before Judge Willett in the district court this forenoon. The question in controversy is whether the independent school district of Marietta or John A. Timmons is the owner of the land.

The village claimed ownership at one time. At a special election, held under a special act of the last general assembly, the district voted to turn the land over to the independent school district of Marietta, presumably for a school building site. Soon afterwards the district posted signs serving notice of the district holding the property of the district. A little later John A. Timmons took possession, tore down the signs, and built a fence around the land. This act precipitated trouble that threatened for a time to result in open violence.

The school district is suing to quiet title and obtain possession. Timmons claims ownership by purchase and quiet-running far back before the general assembly passed the law.

**In the District Court.**  
Mrs. Elizabeth M. Warkup was granted a divorce from Edward L. Warkup by Judge Cummings Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Margaret M. Snyder, widow of J. H. Snyder, was appointed administratrix of her husband's estate, under bond for \$10,000.

Judge Willett, who has been off the bench since Saturday on account of the death of his son-in-law, J. H. Snyder, resumed his work this forenoon.

The suit brought by the Merchants' Bank against J. H. Miller and O. L. Ingledue was dismissed for the defendants when the bank failed this morning to appear to prosecute the case. The action grew out of a claim involving the transfer by Miller to Ingledue of the stock of merchandise at Vanclue.
