The bid of the Western Construction Company was \$1,234; other concrete pavement, \$1,234; brick pavement, \$2.23; curb, 32 cents foot; extra grading, 40 cents a cubic yard; three-inch oak plank, 18 cents a foot. These bids were the lowest of all, excepting for brick pavement and curbing.

For the convenience of acceptance, and so the contractor can get the paving certificates and his money from time to time as work progresses, the job was divided into seven sections. The work will be finished and accepted by sections and plans and schedules for assessments will be prepared one section at a time.

Division by Sections.

Under this division the following will be the sections:

- 1—District No. 1, west on Lincoln Highway.
- 2—District No. 2, east on Lincoln Highway.
- 3—North Third avenue and Webster street.
- 4—Fremont, North Eighth and Summit streets.
- 5—West State and North Ninth streets.
- 6—North Fourth, Fifth and Hughes streets.
- 7—South First and South Tenth and Railroad street and South Fourth and South Fifth avenue.

Carlson to Lay Curbing.

The Western Construction Company has employed Adolph Carlson, a local contractor, to lay the curbing. Work on this will begin at once to keep ahead of the paving.

A representative of the Western Construction Company said this forenoon that the paving job would be at work before June 10. He expects to use Iowa gravel for the coarse ingredient, but it will be shipped in, perhaps from as far distant as Mason City. Gravel will be used exclusively if it can be procured in sufficient quantities. It will be moved from car to job on trains of motor trucks.

Operate in Large Way.

It is promised that the city will be given an exhibition of laying pavement on a large and rapid scale. With good weather the contractor promises 1,500 to 2,000 yards a week.

Taxpayers will be interested in knowing that the Western Construction Company has laid more than 200,000 yards of one-mix concrete pavement in Sioux City, which is reputed to have some of the best pavement of the kind in the country. Included in the work the contractor has done there, is the road to Correctionville, which was built under the same law on which the main roads here are to be paved. In fact it was for this special purpose that Sioux City men got the general assembly to pass the law.

SIoux CITY FIRM AWARDED CONTRACT

WESTERN CONSTRUCTION COMPANY GETS \$91,330 PAVING JOB ON ROADS AND STREETS.

WILL BEGIN WORK WITHIN TWO WEEKS

Successful Bidder Employs Local Contractor to Start Laying Curb at Once—Gravel to Be Used For Coarse Ingredient and Will Be Shipped Here From Distance.

The contract for 80,000 square yards of concrete pavement and 2,370 square yards of brick pavement and curbing for all streets paved was let to the Western Construction Company, of Sioux City, by the city council this forenoon. On the estimated yardage the successful bid will total \$91,330. Work is to begin by June 10 and be completed by Oct. 15. The contractor posts a \$50,000 bond for faithful performance, and incurs a penalty of \$15 a day for failure to complete the work within the specified time. The contract covers South Ninth and Doty streets, District No. 1 of the main road project, and East Main and South Twelfth avenue, District No. 2 of the main road projects, also a long list of streets comprising two and one-half miles.

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- 6—North Fourth, Fifth and Hughes streets.
- 7—South First and South Tenth and Railroad street and South Fourth and South Fifth avenue.

BARNUM CIRCUS JULY 6.
Big Show of Summer Scheduled For This City Early in July.
Barnum & Bailey's circus will appear in Marshalltown on Thursday, July 6. This announcement was made Wednesday by Raymond J. Palmer, advance contracting agent, who was in the city making arrangements for the appearance of the circus in Marshalltown. The Ringling and Barnum shows, which are both controlled by the Ringling Bros., take turns making this part of the country. Last year Barnum's played on the Pacific coast, but this year will travel thru the middle west. The show opened in Madison Square garden, New York, in April, and is now touring New York state, having played Albany Wednesday. The show comes here from Cedar Rapids.

DES MOINES VETERAN DEAD.

Horace Carpenter Dies of Cirrhosis of Liver at Hospital.
Horace Carpenter, aged 76, a member of the soldiers' home from Des Moines since Oct. 18, 1894, died at 1:30 this morning of cirrhosis of the liver. Mr. Carpenter was born in Chittenden county, Vermont, Sept. 19, 1839. He enlisted in Company H, Sixty-seventh Illinois Infantry, June 13, 1862, at Freeport, Ill., and was discharged Oct. 6 of the same year at Chicago. On Feb. 9, 1865, he enlisted in Company E, One Hundred Forty-seventh Illinois, at Dixon, and was finally discharged at Savannah, Ga., Jan. 20, 1866.

Two sons, Earl D. Carpenter, of Mason City, and Harry, of Des Moines, are living, as is also a daughter, Mrs. C. E. Moorman, of Des Moines.
