IOWA HAS BIG PART

CLUB WOMEN PROMINENT IN BIENNIAL MEETING OF GENERAL FEDERATION.

"IOWA IDEA" FINDS FAVOR OF DELEGATES

Director From Every State to Be Rule Hereafter—Iowa Breakfast Proves Most Enjoyable Occasion—Women Respond to Toasts—Mrs. Cummins Among Guests.

New York City, June 1.—Iowa is making a remarkably good showing at the thirteenth biennial of the General Federation of Women's Clubs now in session at New York Seventh Regiment Armory.

Every federated state a director from Iowa women, and that I am proud of Iowa women, and that I am like the mother, which urged to allow her children to romp with the other little folks of the neighborhood in the public square on the plea that it was broadening to the childish vision, replied, as she watched the sports, "I have found my Iowa women most loyal and true. We have been free from the petty jealousies and suspicions and distrust which is not, I find, always the case elsewhere."

Iowa Breakfast Features. Davenport had a special table at the breakfast but the Davenport women were not all able to sit there. Mrs. W. H. Snyder, state correspondent, was seated at one table and Mrs. J. W. Watzek sat at the president's table. Mrs. E. B. Clark, of Des Moines, Iowa's former vice president, was a happily inspired toastmistress.

Mrs. Homer A. Miller, of Des Moines, was introduced as the beautiful gray haired lady who has the gift of dream and state correspondence. Mrs. Clark also added "she is celebrating a wedding anniversary with her husband." Mrs. Miller said she was told her toast was "The Ayes Have It," and she supposed that Iowa amendment which was adopted by the convention, interested her husband, for it was the work which is steadily growing and the need of state representation, the keeping in touch of states with the general executive board. She said nine states—giving their names—had never, in the twenty-five years, since the Federation was organized, had a representative on the board.

Mrs. A. B. Cummins, of Des Moines and Washington, was announced by Mrs. Clark as "Iowa's Pride," and she was greeted with a burst of laughter as she confessed she "usually left public speaking to the senior member of the firm, her husband, and reserved her efforts to kindle lectures, home economics and certain topics." Mrs. Cummins was on the point of taking the 11 o'clock train to Washington to join her husband. She said "the praise of Iowa women is very sweet to me. I say women from my home who are going back to Iowa's green fields and fragrant woods."

Still Loves Iowa. Mrs. James Berryhill, formerly of Des Moines, the Iowa federation's first president who has come across the continent from Angeles to attend the convention, responded to the toast "The Wanderer," "As a woman who was born and has lived in Iowa practically all my life," said Mrs. Berryhill, "I have a right to love and to cherish my old home as"

the best place in the world. One is sometimes lonely for the old friends. California is a land of beautiful flowers and it has given women the suffrage. Come to California. It is on the road to Paradise."

Mrs. Henry H. Taylor, of Greenfield, sometimes familiarly known as "Mrs. Good-Roads Taylor," because she is chairman of the Iowa State Good Roads Committee, recalled in a witty reminiscence, the "absentees." "What would we all do if we hadn't left our husbands at home to earn the money and take care of the babies; and we have left our husbands to look after the house? I will offer the toast 'Here's to our husbands. The it's hard sometime to get on with them, we can't live without them.'"

Mrs. Warren Frederic Thuesen, of New York City, who, as Mrs. Julian Richardson of Waterloo, was elected president of the Iowa Federation at the Davenport biennial, recounted some of the things for which Iowa is famous and took exceptions—wittily—to the list which always and especially includes and emphasizes Iowa's products "pigs and corn." She was greeted with a burst of laughter as she incidentally added "hens." She said there were other things in Iowa of just as great importance, and she closed with the hope "you will all be free citizens soon."

Mrs. Horace Townner, of Corning, Iowa, and Washington, D. C., wife of Representative Townner, eulogized Iowa as she presented the New York man's description of her home state as "a very vague place." She commented on the personal touch, the affectionate interest, Iowa women have for one another and she gave the toast in closing "May the affections of her people like the rivers of her borders flow to an inseparable union."

Mrs. Carroll, of Des Moines, was also a speaker, as was Mrs. Osborn, of Jersey formerly of Rock Oak, who urged the conservation of the Iowa wild flowers. Miss Florence Ward, of Washington, D. C. formerly of Cedar Falls, came in just before the breakfast was over. Miss Ward is in charge of the home economics department of the department of agriculture, Washington. After a few words from Miss Ward, Mrs. Townner said she wished to tell the Iowa women how greatly Miss Ward was appreciated in Washington and that a friend had described her, in his enthusiasm as "a hummer."

Favors Mrs. Dow For President. The entertainment offered by the Thirteenth Biennial is so elaborate that Mrs. Taylor expressed the general feeling of a too great wealth of intellectual "goodies," when she said "one may have intellectual as well as physical indigestion." The appreciation of some of the many good things that have come to the Iowa women was voiced in three votes of thanks at the breakfast. One was to the management for its fine service, another for the flowers and a third to the biennial board for what it has done for Iowa women.

Iowa will favor Mrs. Frederic Dow, former president of Illinois, for the presidency. Mrs. Joseph Evans Cowles, of California, and Mrs. Nathaniel B. Smith, of Ohio, the two presidential possibilities talked of, have not had until the last few days, even the support of their own delegation. Mrs. Cowles' friends have been wearing her name on their buttons, and she is underneath instead of outside their badge.

MEN OVERTAX HEARTS

CAUSES MORE DEATHS THAN ANY OTHER DISEASE, STATISTICS SHOW.

FIGURES OF EACH MONTH SHOW STEADY INCREASE

Dr. Sumner, of State Health Board, Advises People to Sleep More or Get More Rest—Department Finishes Tabulating Deaths in Iowa During February—Two Fatal Auto Accidents.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, June 1.—Heart trouble causes more deaths in Iowa than any other one disease, the statistics filed in the office of the state board of health show. Each month when the figures are compiled the column for this disease adds up the heaviest. This does not include the deaths reported as heart failure for the office does not put those in with the figures on heart trouble.

It is not alone the older people who die from some form of this trouble but younger people as well. Reports from the state show that it is the cause of many deaths all over the country. "If people would sleep more or get more rest they would not experience so much trouble with heart disease in its various forms," said Dr. Sumner, secretary of the board, in commenting on the condition. "People over tax their hearts. They need rest."

The department has just finished tabulating the deaths for February in this state of which there was 2,198. Of this number 445 were between the ages of 70 and 80 years and sixty-seven were past 90 years of age. During the summer months the accidental deaths run much higher than in the winter while deaths from lung trouble decrease.

Factories Fail to Report. A. L. Urick, state labor commissioner, is having trouble completing his statistics on manufacturing because many factories have failed to report. He has undertaken a complete directory of Iowa manufacturing plants. Approximately 4,000 establishments have reported but there yet remain some 1,200 to hear from. The law requires that these reports be made.

In a letter sent out today to those manufacturers who are delinquent in reporting Urick, among other things, says: "The showing for the state, your county and your line of manufacture will be lessened if you fail to do your part. The law contemplates the inclusion of every dollar invested, every article of merchandise, the value of every product, every wage-earner and every dollar earned to prove our factory advantages and the real worth of Iowa as a state in which to live."
