

CAMPAIGN CLOSES; ELECTION MONDAY

BALLOTS SENT OUT TODAY BY COUNTY AUDITOR TO ELECTION BOARDS.

POLLS OPEN IN CITY FROM 7 A. M. TO 8 P. M.

Polls in Country Precincts Will Be Open From 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. Candidates Active in Last Days' Work of Campaign—R. E. Sears is First 'Absent Voter' to Ballot.

With only one more week day until the primary election candidates were today preparing to close their campaigns Saturday. In the office of County Auditor W. E. McLeland final preparations for the election were being made. Ballots were sealed this forenoon and this afternoon they were distributed by automobiles to the country and small town precincts. The ballots for the city precincts will be delivered very early Monday forenoon.

Only Two Party Tickets. Although the voters will find four party ballots at the polls only two have any candidates for county offices on them. All four contain the non-partisan judicial ticket, but only the republican and democrat have a full list of candidates.

On the republican district ticket voters will find Senator Wallace H. Arney and John B. Classen, each seeking the party nomination for the seat in the senate of the general assembly. Representative W. N. Gilbert, of State Center, is alone and unopposed as a candidate for renomination for election to the house.

Republican County Ticket. The name of A. W. Dobson, now deceased, heads the list of candidates for county offices on the republican ticket.

For county treasurer, H. J. Allard seeks the nomination for which Treasurer S. M. Gause, the present incumbent, is also a candidate.

G. W. Gilbert is opposed to Oscar Rosen for the party nomination for clerk of the district courts. Rosen is the present deputy.

In the next group, for sheriff, will be where a lively contest will develop. There are four candidates, C. R. Gault, Bert Goodale, Charles Hurd and J. C. Koonitz. Goodale is a deputy sheriff now and Koonitz is superintendent of the county farm.

Miss Nora E. Wilkey, county recorder, is unopposed in her candidacy for renomination.

Likewise County Attorney Ray P. Scott, candidate for renomination, has no opposition for the post, neither has Dr. R. L. Lynn, who seeks renomination for coroner.

For members of the board of supervisors for the term beginning Jan. 2, 1917, there are W. H. Jones and Leroy H. Thompson. Jones is now a member of the board. For the term beginning Jan. 2, 1918, Henry C. Goecke, of Marietta township, has no opponent on the ticket.

For the township offices Justices B. L. Burritt and S. E. Peck are candidates for renomination and M. M. O'Driscoll is a candidate. Charles Sandvig, a former police officer, is a candidate for constable.

The Democratic Slats. On the district ticket of the democratic party T. F. Bradford and George Herman, both of this city, have no opposition for nomination for senator and representative, respectively.

In fact all thru the county ticket the democrats have no opposition for nomination of any candidate for each office. They are the following: Auditor, A. T. Roberts; treasurer, T. H. Bendlage; clerk of district court, H. H. Craney; sheriff, J. G. Edgar, the present sheriff; recorder, Miss Kate Timmons; attorney, Robert E. Johnson; coroner, Dr. Grove W. Harris; member of board of supervisors, term beginning Jan. 2, 1917, George Bink; for term beginning Jan. 2, 1918, C. R. Lynch. The latter is a member of the present board.

On the township ticket, J. P. Clem is a candidate for constable and F. H. Pepper for party committeeman.

Casts First 'Absent' Vote. R. E. Sears, of this city, who will be absent from the city Monday, this forenoon cast the first 'absent' vote to be cast for the election. Mr. Sears voted in the second ward and he prepared his ballot in the office of County Auditor McLeland.

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
