WATKINS' WILDNESS LOSES TO SHAMROCKS

SOUTH PAW ERRATIC, AND WITH RYAN'S ERROR GAME IS LOST 8 TO 2.

PITCHERS OVERWORKED, NO RELIEF AVAILABLE

Waterloo Steps Into Lead in Last Part of Third, and Clinches Contest in Fourth, When Four Register—Hits Are Even, But Anson's Errors Are Costly.

Waterloo, June 20.—Waterloo won the final game of the series with the Ansons by taking advantage of Watkins' wildness in the first few innings of play, the deciding frame being the fourth, when four runs were registered by the Shamrocks. The final count was 8 to 2. Marshalltown drove out as many safeties during the afternoon, but the Ansons were unable to bunch them after the first inning. Neusel was in trouble several times, but escaped with the assistance of some fast fielding.

Manager Boyle was forced to leave Watkins on the slab, as his twirlers have been worked hard during the past few days. Slattery and Uich pitched Sunday's double bill, while Penner pitched the most of Saturday's contest, which Watkins started. Watkins would have got away in the first inning but for an error by Ryan, who threw wild to first in his effort to cut off Flaherty. The ball went to the bleachers and Collins scored. This tied the count, as Eunik had doubled and scored in the first half of the opening when Murphy shot a liner to right. Murphy scored in the third inning by getting a walk, after two were down, going to third on a single by Nespo, and scoring on Brannigan's error of Lee's grounder.

Take Lead in Third. Waterloo stepped into the lead in the last of the first when Collins opened with a single, went to second on a single by Donahue, both runners advancing on Sheldon's sacrifice. Flaherty went out to LeBeau, but Collins scored after the catch. Hart walked and staged a double steal with Donahue, the latter scoring.

Four runners registered in the fourth, when Brannigan opened with a single. Watkins attempted to catch him off first, but flew wide, Brannigan going to second. Miller walked and Bescher was hit by a pitched ball. Neusel then singled to right, scoring Brannigan and Miller. Collins went down on a grounder, but Donahue made his third single, scoring Bescher and sending Neusel to third. Lee attempted to catch Neusel off third, but Eunik let the ball get by him and Neusel registered. Sheldon scored in the fifth on a sensational running catch of a low line drive off Flaherty's bat to short left. Hart scored the final run by walking to start the fifth, taking second on Brannigan's rap to Eunik, being sacrificed to third by Miller and scoring on Bescher's sacrifice fly.

LeBeau came near putting Neusel out of commission in the second inning when one of his drives hit Neusel on the leg. The ball was traveling at a terrific speed, and after hitting Neusel bounded clear to the right field bleachers. Altho Neusel walked with a limp during the remainder of the game he insisted upon finishing it.

Triple Goes Glimmering. Head Ralph Miller worked a little faster in the fifth inning he could have staged a triple play. Murphy had reached first on an error and advanced to second when Nespo walked. Lee


