TO PREPARE FAIR GROUNDS FOR PLAY

PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS COMMITTEE GET READY TO BUY EQUIPMENT.

BOYS SET TO WORK PREPARING GROUNDS

Committee, Altho Still Lacking Sufficient Money to Equip Playground Fully, Will Make Start—Will Be Fine Playground For East End Children When Plans Are Realized.

By scraping together small amounts of money until the sum is large enough to make a start, the parks and playgrounds committee of the Marshalltown Club is preparing for the establishment of a playground in the county fair grounds. With money enough for a beginning, the committee expects soon to buy the first equipment, and the work of preparing the ground was started today.

The committee has had donated by the baseball association and individuals \$180. That is enough for a beginning, but it needs much more to equip even this playground.

To Buy Swing and Slide.
The committee is expected soon to place an order for a giant swing and slide, the latter twenty-four feet long and twelve feet high. Both are much used playground equipment for small children.

Boys' Secretary McKee, of the Y. M. C. A., has taken charge of a group of boys who are to prepare the grounds for tennis, baseball and volleyball. The site for the tennis court has been chosen just to the left inside the main entrance that was space used for machinery exhibits at the county fair.

A baseball diamond and volleyball court will be prepared and laid out in the open rectangular space east of the main drive. It will require some work to level the ground and lay out the dimensions for these grounds. This work is to be done by the boys under the direction of Mr. McKee.

Individuals Help Plan.
The money available came from tickets sold for a baseball game early in the season, a donation of \$25 from the baseball association and donations from individuals ranging from \$2 to \$10. To equip this one playground properly will require \$200 or \$300 more. During county fair week the equipment will be moved and the playgrounds vacated for the fair association, which is allowing the committee to develop the unused space into a playground free of charge.

Native African to Talk.
Thomas B. Kalane, a native African and converted heathen, will speak this evening at the prayer meeting at the Christian church. Mr. Kalane is a young man of about 30, who has received his education in this country and is preparing to go to his own people to preach the gospel.

Kalane's history is interesting. A member of a tribe on the east coast of Africa, he happened to find a paper printed in the Kafir language, con-

taining an advertisement of Booker T. Washington's school, Kalane determined that he would gain an education if possible. He set out for a three months' walk to Johannesburg, where he worked in the mines to obtain enough money to attend school in Zululand. His preliminary education completed, he came to this country and entered Wilberforce University, Wilberforce, O. He was unable to speak a word of English when he reached New York City, and in June, 1914, was graduated from the university with the degree of bachelor of divinity. Later he was graduated from the Southern Christian Institute at Edwards, Miss.

WARNING TO AUTOISTS.

East Main Street Dangerous Where Grading is Being Done.
Just now the East Main street road, about half a mile southwest of the river bridge is in a dangerous condition, especially at night, because of a deep fill that is being made at the approach of a bayou bridge. First Railway System.

The first railway system in North America, the Baltimore & Ohio, had its beginning eighty-eight years ago, when ground was broken at Baltimore. The Fourth of July of that year was a memorable one in the Maryland metropolis, and all business was suspended, while men from all over the state took part in the parade.

The ground-breaking ceremony was conducted by Charles Carroll of Carrollton, the last survivor of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, who was then 92 years old. As he drove the spade into the earth the venerable statesman exclaimed: "I consider this among the most important acts of my life, second only to that of signing the Declaration of Independence, if second even to that." The city of Baltimore and the state of Maryland each contributed half a million dollars toward the construction of the railway. Horses were used at first to draw the cars, and the first American-built locomotive was constructed by Peter Cooper for this line. The railway was a development of the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal Company, which in turn had its origin in the Potomac Company, of which Washington was the first president.

Another Good Rain Helps Corn
