TORKELSON BLOWS; CLAYBARKERS WIN

MASON CITY GRABS GAME IN NINTH AFTER ANSONS APPARENTLY HAD WON.

PENNER INEFFECTIVE AS RELIEF PITCHER

Sent to Mound in Ninth With Bases Full, and Fails to Stop Opposition—Two Hits Drive in Runs and Mason City Cops Game by Score of 4 to 3—Torkelson Passes Eight.

Mason City, Aug. 9.—In a heart-breaking ninth inning finish, after "Red" Torkelson had filled the bases and Kenneth Penner, the Anson star, had been sent in to stop the riot, three hits broke up yesterday's game and the locals won by the score of 4 to 3. The Ansons had been tied with the locals thru nine innings. In their part of the ninth they worked across two more tallies, making the count 3 to 1. When the Claybarkers came up for their last but Torkelson filled the bases by allowing singles and a walk. Timely hits by the Claybarkers broke up the same and they won handily.

Torkelson had pitched pretty good ball all thru the game, but toward the last weakened. "Red" passed eight men during the progress of the game and in the fatal ninth he had to be taken out.

Torkelson Fills Bases. Richardson started the fireworks for the locals by a single into deep center. Weeks, hitting for Corey, singled in the same place. Brausen then sacrificed them to second and third, Fitzpatrick taking Weeks' place on the bases. Fortman waited on Torkelson and was given a walk and the bases were filled. Here Penner was called upon, but with Brown up there was no stopping the onrush of the Clays. Brown lifted a high sacrifice fly to LeBeau which scored Richardson.

Black then singled into right and scored Fitzpatrick, tying the score. Fortman on third began to jockey along the base line trying to worry Penner which he succeeded in doing. Schroeder at the bat had two strikes called on him and before Penner had finished on his windup of the third delivery, Fortman had taken a long lead. With a quick dash he was at the plate only an instant after Leo cracked out an infield hit. Fortman's play had upset Penner, who, when he fielded the ball, threw wild to Frough and everybody was safe all around. Black crossed the plate only a few steps behind "Dutch" but the run was not needed as Fortman's broke the tie and the game was won.

Leo Hits in Runs. The first run for the Ansons came in the fifth. Murphy singled to left field and was scored on a hit by Eunick. The Ansons had been within striking distance before this but had been stopped by the great playing of the locals. In the sixth the bases were full and only by spectacular playing were the Claybarkers able to keep the scoring down to one run. In the ninth Eunick started off with a three base blow into left field. Lunte was given a life on an error by Schroeder and they were moved up a base by LeBeau's sacrifice. A hit by Lee scored the base runners but further scoring was prevented.

The first run for the locals came in the eighth when Fortman was given a pass by Torkelson which was followed by another pass to Brown. Black attempted a sacrifice but on an error by Torkelson was safe at first. A sacrifice fly by Kensei scored Fortman. Then came the ninth with all its hair-raising ball playing on both sides. Corey and Torkelson both pitched good games but the support of each was shaky at times. Torkelson's mates saved him from a worse drubbing than he got as he was saved many times by the brilliant fielding of his pals. Corey was steady at all times and allowed only two passes. The score.

BRUNER'S GRANDSON DROWNED.

Kenneth Bruner, Aged 14, Formerly of This City, Drowns in Montana.

Word received by Salem Bruner from Livingston, Mont., tells of the drowning of his grandson, Kenneth Bruner, aged 14, in the Yellowstone river, June 18. The boy was not found until Aug. 5, thirty miles from Steam from where the boy was drowned. The particulars of the accident were not sent to the grandfathers.

The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Bruner, who lived in this city prior to nine years ago. Their home was at 295 Anson street. Kenneth was their oldest son.

FIND BABY'S MOTHER.

Anna White, of Sauk Center, Minn., Held—Says Child is Hers.

With the confession of Miss Anna White, aged 27, of Sauk Center, Minn., that she was the mother of the baby boy left on the court house steps Tuesday afternoon, new complications have arisen in the case, and the disposition of the baby may be a difficult task. The woman was arrested by Officer Delahoyde and Merchant Police Cummings at the Chicago Great Western station about 6:30 Tuesday evening. When taken to the jail annex she admitted having placed the baby on the court house steps, but said the child did not belong to her. This forenoon

she broke down, and confessed to County Attorney Scott that the baby was hers, and that he had been born in the University hospital at Iowa City three weeks ago. She told the attorney that she lived in Sauk Center, Minn., but did not dare to go home as her mother had sent word not to bring the baby with her. She declared she was willing to take the baby, however, if the police would release her. County Attorney Scott may make an effort to have the baby provided for in another way, as he thinks the mother is unfit to take the proper care of the infant.

That the baby boy will be well provided for in case he is not returned to his mother was assured this morning, when the telephone at the court house rest room began ringing at an early hour. Up to 10:30 this forenoon Mrs. Emma Weatherly, the matron, had had ten applications from people who were eager to take the little foundling into their homes and hearts. She said she would have the baby brought in from the Daniel Andrews home west of the city, where he was taken Tuesday evening.




