

Manufacturing in Iowa Doubles in Ten Years

Special to Times-Republican.

Des Moines, Aug. 16.—Government figures on the manufacturing industry of Iowa, whose publication was authorized today through the state department of labor shows that Iowa's manufactured products amounted to \$316,750,000 in 1914. This is an increase of 93.5 per cent over ten years ago.

In fact, Iowa's factory products which heretofore have made a small showing in comparison with her agricultural products, made a larger per cent gain in ten years than did the products of the soil which show a gain in ten years of 76 per cent.

The value of farm and garden crops which is a gain of \$437,225,652, which is a gain of 110,000,000 in value over the farm output of 1904.

Wages About Doubled.

In the past ten years wages in Iowa factories have increased 73.5 per cent; the number of people employed has increased 37.5 per cent and the number of establishments 17.3 per cent.

The total number of establishments

reported by the department of commerce is 5,614; the number of wage earners 63,113; the total wages paid, \$39,860,000; the cost of materials \$305,451,000.

The slaughtering and meat packing industry leads all others in value of products.

The total value of the products of this industry in 1914 was \$74,239,000. Cattle, cheese and condensed milk products totaled the next highest, being valued at \$27,606,000.

There has been a marked increase in the output and value of the artificial stone industry, building materials, clothing, copper, tin products, foundry, and machine shops, gas plants, medicines and marble and stone work.

GERMANS RESENT CHARGES.

Deny Army Officers Practice Cruelties—Fret Against Defamation.

German Division Headquarters on the Somme Front, Aug. 13, via Berlin, Aug. 14, via London, Aug. 13.—The Germans at the front bitterly resent the charges of inhumanity and brutality which have been brought against them by their opponents.

A number of German officers who were interviewed by an Associated Press correspondent protested strongly against what they termed the campaign of defamation which was being waged against them.

A high German officer who has lectured on the various actions of the present offensive said:

"We officers and men at the front are well informed on what our opponents and neutrals say of us. We know that we are called Huns and barbarians. Well, I can say it has

not softened our feelings any, nor will it. The more the howls for our destruction the harder we will fight, and the last Englishman will face the last German."

"We are neither Huns nor barbarians and if severe measures were resorted to by us they were the outcome of the most serious military necessity. At any rate, slander can not influence us except in an increasing determination to win."

"Our men see daily what the lot of Germany would be in the case the seat of war were transferred there. To prevent this is the burning desire of all of us."

Similar sentiments were expressed by officers at every point on the front visited by the correspondent. There was not the slightest inclination to underrate their opponents. A general referred to the French and English infantrymen as "poor devils," and expressed the wish that peace would soon end the useless carnage of human beings.

SUPREME COURT CHANGES.

Full Majority Appointed by Former President Taft in His Term.

There is not a single member of the supreme court of President Harrison's day now serving on the bench. Twenty-six years is not a long time for continuity of service in the lower courts. There are hundreds of judges appointed at the age of 35 who are still in the prime of their life and not a few cases of this kind are to be found in the lower federal and state courts.

Even Chief Justice White, however, is able to point to a judicial record of only 26 years. He was appointed by Cleveland in February, 1894, and all the members with whom he was associated at that time have passed away. President Taft had the honor of appointing a full majority of the supreme court in the course of his four years in office.

He appointed Justice Hughes, Van Devanter, Lamar and Pitney.

President Wilson has already made two appointments—McReynolds and Brandeis—and has now nominated Mr. Clarke to succeed Justice Hughes. Despite all the changes that have taken place in recent years, more cases were disposed of by the supreme court during its recent term than in any other term since 1890. A total of 547 cases were decided, while in 1890 there were 610 cases. There still remain on the docket 522 cases.—Thomas F. Logan, in Leslie's Weekly.





CUMMINS SCOLDS SENATE.

Takes Colleagues to Task for Neglecting Their Duties.

Washington, Aug. 16.—In a speech opposing certain features of the anti-trust bill, Senator Cummins lectured the senate for the failure of senators to attend to business. He complimented Senator Simmons for his speech explaining the bill. The average number of senators who heard his discussion was six, said Senator Cummins, who said he was entitled to a better audience. Senator Cummins enumerated speeches by a half dozen other senators and said the average number of senators who were in the chamber to listen was four and one-half.

He said he was profoundly sorry for the vice-president, who has to keep order over one speaker and sometimes as many as ninety or more vacant chairs.

"The salary of the presiding officer ought to be doubled in order to compensate him for the torture he must feel," said Senator Cummins. "We will destroy the senate and the confidence of the people unless we change the customs or habits into which we are rapidly falling."

LIVE WIRE KILLS BOY.

Little Lee Dresher Backs Into Instant Death While on Box Car.

Cedar Rapids, Aug. 16.—Blue smoke rising from the top of a box car on an interurban siding at Tenth street and Eighth avenue shortly after 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, caused a workman to climb on the car to make an investigation. He was horrified to find the electrocuted body of little Lee Dresher, a 13-year-old boy. The smoke was coming from the heels of the lad's bare feet.

It had burn on the back of his neck told the sad story. Evidently he had climbed to the top of an exceptionally high box car to look around, as so many children are in the habit of doing. An apple was in his hand and the one bite he had taken was in his mouth.

Evidently he had stepped backward and the back of his head had come in contact with a sagging trolley wire carrying 600 volts. The car had a tin roof, completing the circuit.

DEMOCRAT ORATORS COMING.
