

SHOOTING WIFE AND SELF

ROY MANN FATALLY WOUNDS MRS. MANN AND SENDS BULLET THRU OWN BRAIN.

WOMAN FATALLY HURT; MANN DIES INSTANTLY

Shooting Takes Place at Home of Mrs. Mann's Parents at Boone—Couple Recently Divorced—Murderer Followed Wife From Fort Dodge—Jealousy Believed to be Cause.

Boone, Aug. 17.—Roy Mann, a laborer, is dead and his former wife in the Eleanor Moore hospital, seriously wounded as a result of a quarrel at the home of the woman's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Brown on East First street. The shooting took place about 8 o'clock and was witnessed by Ralph Cooper, Everett Brown, the woman's brother, and Leone Boyd, her niece. Mann, it is said, shot his divorced wife and then turned the gun on himself. Jealousy is thought to have been the cause of the shooting.

Divorced Last March. Mann was divorced from his wife, who was formerly Miss Olive Brown, last March. Witnesses at the coroner's inquest testified that he was jealous of her and that he had threatened to kill her if he ever found her with another man. There are two children, a boy, Vincent, aged 8, and a girl 18 months old.

Mann had come to Boone Tuesday afternoon from Fort Dodge; he was going on to Des Moines later to look for work it was stated.

He had been with his wife some time before the shooting took place, according to witnesses. There had been no loud talking or seemingly any quarrel but Leone Boyd testified at the inquest that she noticed Mrs. Mann had been crying.

Saved Last Bullet For Himself. The shooting took place in the yard just in front of the house. Mann emptied all five chambers of a revolver, three of the bullets flying wild. The fourth struck the woman in the forehead about an inch and a half above the right eye and is lodged somewhere in her brain, according to physicians. She is not expected to live. The fifth bullet, Mann saved for himself. The lead entered his left temple, plowed its way thru his head and came out on the right side. His death in the opinion of physicians, was instantaneous.

Ralph Cooper, who was at the Brown home, when the shooting took place, hurried into the house and telephoned for the police and an ambulance. The woman's parents are out of the city.

POLICE STOP BOXING MATCH.

Prevent Second Exhibition at Cedar Rapids—Big Crowd Disappointed. Cedar Rapids, Aug. 17.—Boxing was taboed here last night apparently because of the opposition of the police authorities for the second day's program of the boxing carnival staged by Frankie Whitney and backed by the Cedar Rapids Commercial Club, was prevented by Commissioner Evans. Recently Frankie Whitney was prevented from meeting Young Brown of St. Joseph in a ten-round bout upon orders from Attorney General Cosgrove.

Boxing enthusiasts and boxers from all parts of the state were on hand to witness the milling performances but were forced to return home disappointed. Whitney announced that Commissioner Evans refused to allow the men to enter the ring in Green's opera house.

Iowa City, Aug. 17.—Jesse Lewis, aged 23, accused of forging and cashing checks in Iowa City, and then fleeing from the city, was brought back from Centralia, Ill., by Detective C. E. Carrell, and was arraigned today before Justice George A. Ewing. He secured a postponement of the hearing until Aug. 18. Lacking a bond of \$500, however, he was taken to the county jail. A pathetic feature of the case was that his wife would not leave him, and with her babe in her arms, accompanied him to jail.


