CHRISTIAN CHURCH CONFERENCE AUG. 30

MEMBERS OF CHURCHES OF COUNTY TO MEET AT BETHEL GROVE.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AND AMES MAN ON PROGRAM

Rev. C. V. Allison of Cedar Rapids, to be One of the Speakers—Services to be Held Morning, Afternoon and Evening—Addresses Will Include Many Subjects of Interest.

Members of Christian churches of the county and Hardin county will hold a conference at the Bethel Grove church Wednesday, Aug. 30, for the discussion of plans for work during fall and winter, and hearing talks on different branches of church work. Rev. C. V. Allison, of Cedar Rapids, district superintendent of missions in the northeastern Iowa district, will be one of the principal speakers, and all of the Christian preachers in the county will be on the program. Beginning at 9:45 and continuing through the forenoon there will be a program of addresses. Dinner will be served at noon. In the afternoon the program will be continued, and music will be furnished by the Bethel orchestra.

Ames Man to Address Gathering.
One of the principal addresses of the day will be made by a representative of the Iowa State Agricultural college at Ames, who will tell the audience of some of the work the church is doing among college students. His talk will be in the forenoon and will follow the opening address, to be given by Rev. C. V. Allison. The Bethel orchestra will also play in the forenoon.

Scheduled Program Ready.
Following the address by the Ames speaker the meeting will adjourn for dinner, after which Rev. Allison will conduct a bible study, to be followed by an address on "Missions" by Rev. W. M. Baker, pastor of the Central Church of Christ of this city. Rev. W. P. Clark, pastor of the Christian church at Liscomb, will speak on "The Bible School" and its place in the church.

Under the subject "The Local Church," four addresses will be given, all dealing with the main subject, but each distinctive in itself. C. F. Ladd will speak on "Founder and Foundation"; C. H. Strawn, on "Officers"; Rev. W. R. Foster, of Union, on "Ordinances"; and Rev. Paul Becker of Whitten, on "Mission." Each speaker will be limited to twenty minutes.

Devotional services will be held in the Bethel church in the evening, beginning at 7:30. Rev. C. V. Allison will speak on "The Whole Duty of the Whole Church" at 8 o'clock.

CHAUTAQUA AT ALBION.


