WATKINS AND BYERS DEFEAT FORMER PAPER PALS

FORMER ACTS AS RELIEF PITCHER AND LATTER DRIVES IN WINNING RUN.

CLINTON TAKES LONG SUNDAY GAME, 5 TO 4

Pilots Gain Big Early Lead, But Ansons Come Back and Drive Drohan From Mound—Torkelson Saves Own Game Saturday by Putting Ball Over Fence—Games Fought Desperately.

Special to Times-Republican. Clinton, Aug. 28.—Marshalltown lost a desperate game to Clinton here yesterday by the score of 5 to 4 in ten innings of play. Like Saturday's game, the visitors made a desperate attempt to win by tying the score and driving out four runs in the seventh, but were unable to get the winning run across the plate before the local scored in the tenth.

The Ansons came near winning the game in the eighth when, with Lunte on second, Prough singled to center, a perfect throw to the plate by Nolt nipped the shortstop by inches.

Penner easy in early rounds. Clinton again took an early lead and apparently had the game on ice as the Ansons were only able to collect one scratch hit off the offerings of Drohan in the first six innings. Penner was easy for the locals the first three innings, when they collected six hits for a total of four runs. After that the Cleveland recruit tightened and it was not until the tenth the locals again could cross the rubber.

A single by Wilkes, an error by Lunte, Sears' sacrifice and Schliebner's two-lagger down the third base line scored two for the locals. In the third Nolt singled and went to third on Sears' hit to right, the latter taking second on the throw to third. Schliebner scored Nolt with a long fly to center. Sears took third on Miller's out to Prough and scored on Penner's hit after that Penner was tight in the pinches until the fatal tenth.

Drive Drohan From Pan. Marshalltown fell on Drohan in the seventh and sent the veteran to cover with a volley of five blows and four runs. Eunick opened this inning with a single to left, and went to third on Lunte's double. LeBeau walked and choked the bars. Eunick scored on a wild pitch, and the rest of the runners all advanced a base. Lee forced Lunte at the plate. Prough doubled and scored LeBeau. Ryan hit to Corriegan, who tried to head off Lee at the plate, but hit the runner in the back with the ball. Penner singled off Drohan's shins and Prough scored. Wanner singled and filled the bases. At this juncture Watkins was sent in to relieve Drohan. He fanned Murphy and Eunick ended the rally by flying out to Miller.

Former Ansons Wreak Game. Both sides played a desperate ball, getting men on bases in each of the following innings. Clinton got a man as far as third base in the ninth, but Penner was equal to the emergency and set Sears down on an easy chance. The winning run counted in the tenth. Miller lived on Lunte's error, and Byers scored him with a three-base hit to center.

Both teams gave their pitchers excellent support, and circus catches by LeBeau, Sears, and Wilkes featured the game. Fast double plays by both teams also helped to keep runners away from the plate, as they came in places when the pitchers were in trouble. The score:

TORKELSON WINS OWN GAME.

Home Run Hit Turns Tide of Battle and Ansons Nose Out Clinton.

Clinton, Aug. 28.—Marshalltown defeated Clinton here Saturday in the second game of the series in a great uphill game by the score of 3 to 2. It was one of the hardest fought games of the season on the Clinton grounds, and by fighting to the last man the Ansons pulled out one run to the good. Kluckholm had the best of "Red" Torkelson until the eighth inning, when the home twirler waved and Torkelson, by putting the ball over the fence for a home run, upset Kluckholm, who lost control of himself in the next inning and allowed the score to be tied before Drohan could come to the rescue. It was too late for the veteran to save the game, and two sacrifice hits brought in the winning run, which Kluckholm had allowed to get on the bases.

Clinton started out early, and with Kluckholm going better than he had gone at any time since joining the Pilots, it looked like a sure thing that came the explosion. With two out in the eighth Torkelson sailed one a hundred feet over the left field fence, and

"JIM" DROHAN PASSES.

Grand Old Man of Clinton Pilots Hurls Last Game Against Anons Sunday.

"Jim" Drohan, the grand old man of the Clinton Pilots, has pitched his last game. Drohan has retired from the game to accept a position with the Burlington railway at Galesburg, Ill., where he has made his winter home for several years. Drohan expects to leave soon for Fall River, Mass., where he will visit friends before taking up his new duties with the Burlington. Should one of the Boston clubs win a pennant this year and the world series be staged in Beantown, Drohan will remain in the east to witness the games at Boston.

Drohan is 35 years of age, and has been pitching winning ball for sixteen years, having entered professional ranks in 1900. He has been one of the leading pitchers of the league this year, and has saved many games for the Pilots as relief pitcher. He has been able to go into the game without warming up, and has generally proved effective. Drohan took the management of the Clinton club this year, but resigned in mid-season. Much credit is due him, however, for the good showing of the Pilots, as he assembled a team which was capable of battling the best clubs of the league.

Yesterday was "Drohan day" at Clinton, and the veteran was sent against Penner. He held the Ansons to one hit for six innings, and apparently had the game won, but a rally in the seventh caused his retirement. Watkins, the former Anson hurler, was sent in to save the contest.

With the retirement of Drohan the Central association has few of the "old timers" remaining, and but one pitcher, Zackert, who can remember when Drohan broke into league baseball.

START GAMES AT 3 O'CLOCK.

Closing Games of Season to Be Called Half Hour Earlier Than Formerly.

Owing to the shortening of the days and the early sunset, the closing games of the Central association in this city will be called at 3 o'clock instead of 3:30, as heretofore. Manager Boyle has asked that the change be made because of the difficulty experienced in recent games which were prolonged until the shadows falling on the playing field made the playing of the game difficult.

Wanner is a veteran and has the reputation of being a hard hitting gardener. He showed well at Clinton in his first game.

COUNCIL LEVIES 43 MILLS TAXES

LEVY FOR 1917 IS 2.5 MILLS HIGHER THAN LEVY PAID THIS YEAR.

BRIDGE FUND ADDED TO CITY'S BUDGET

Addition of 3 Mills, However, Cuts Out County Levy of 5 Mills For the Same Purpose—One Mill Added For Paving Main Roads—Levy For Sewers is Reduced—Other Levies.

Forty-three mills were ordered levied against city property of the first class, to be paid in 1917, by the city council at its meeting held this forenoon. The levy is 2.5 mills more than the levy made last year by the council and being paid in taxes this year. Most important among the levies are two new ones. One is for bridges and the other is for the improvement and paving of the main roads leading into the city.

A levy was made for each of the old funds. The tabulation, showing the comparative levies in each fund for next year and this is:

A total of 4.5 mills was added over the levy made last year, and 2 mills were cut out, leaving a net increase of 2.5 mills over the 1915 levy.

Where Increase Comes.

The principal increase was the new bridge fund. The city has become a city of the first class and must pay for its own bridges and the cost of their upkeep. Heretofore the county has done this. The council levied 3 mills for this fund. But taxpayers of the city will no longer be assessed for the county bridge fund, which last year was 5 mills. Release from paying the county bridge tax levy will more than offset the new city levy for bridges.

The other new fund of 1 mill for the improvement of the main roads and streets leading into the city, is a special fund for this particular purpose. It is intended to pay the city's share of these paving projects. The law fixes 1 mill as the limit for this purpose, but the levy at that rate can be extended over a period of years.

Old Funds Reduced.

One-half mill was added to the park fund, increasing it from 2 mills to 2.5 mills. The increase is needed, not only for the improvements being made in Riverview park, but for general park purposes.

The sewer fund was reduced from

2 mills to 1 mill. This was made possible by reason of the city changing its system of paying for new sewers by charging the cost to the abutting property instead of paying for it out of the city's sewer fund. Probably next year, or eventually at any rate, this fund will be lowered to no more than half a mill.

The city is getting the judgments obtained against it in litigation paid, so the judgment fund was reduced from 2.5 mills to 1.5 mills.

The usual 5-mill levy for road purposes against strictly agricultural property within the city limits, was levied this year as last.
