

C. YEAGER AND WIFE MARRIED FIFTY YEARS

OLD RESIDENTS OF CITY CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY AT DAUGHTERS HOME.

RESIDENTS OF CITY TWENTY-EIGHT YEARS

Now Members of Soldiers' Home, and Both Enjoying Good Health For People of Their Years—Anniversary Gathering Held at F. W. Moehrl Home, Where Friends Honor Old Couple.

Surrounded by two of their four children and many friends, Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Yeager, of the soldiers' home, old residents of this city, celebrated today the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage. The anniversary proper does not come until Monday, but today proved more convenient for the celebration of the event, which took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Moehrl, 108 North Fifth avenue. Mrs. Moehrl is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Yeager.

Fifty friends of Mr. and Mrs. Yeager were entertained at the Moehrl home at a reception held from 2 to 5 o'clock. The rooms were decorated with golden rods and asters. On a table was a large bouquet of roses, sent to Mr. and Mrs. Yeager by Frank M. Thomas, W. R. C. No. 9, of which Mrs. Yeager has long been a member. Mrs. Moehrl was assisted by Mesdames O. J. Salina and John Moehrl in serving refreshments. Mr. and Mrs. Yeager were the recipients of many gifts, including a purse of gold from the children. **Have Lived Here Twenty-Eight Years.** Mr. and Mrs. Yeager have lived in this city almost twenty-eight years, having come from a farm in Indiantown township, Tama county, in October, 1888.

Mr. and Mrs. Yeager are both natives of Pennsylvania. Mr. Yeager having been born at Millersburg, Lancaster county, June 22, 1844, and Mrs. Yeager at Port Carbon, Schuylkill county, Oct. 6, 1843. Mrs. Yeager was Eliza Murty prior to her marriage. Mr. Yeager came to Iowa when he was 5 years old, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Yeager, settling in Scott county. Mrs. Yeager's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Murty, came to this state in 1832, and settled in Indiantown township, Tama county, near where the old town of Butlerville stood. Mr. Yeager and Miss Murty were married in this city Sept. 11, 1865. Judge Lammpan performed the ceremony in the home of Obad Caswell, which then stood where the New England store is now situated, at the corner of Main street and Second avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Yeager moved to a farm in the same neighborhood where Mrs. Yeager's parents lived, and resided there until they came to Marshalltown, with the exception of a few years spent in Boone.

Mr. Yeager Former Deputy Sheriff. Not long after Mr. and Mrs. Yeager came to this city Mr. Yeager was appointed by Mayor Nelson Ames a member of the city police force, and served for eighteen months during 1889-90. During John S. Hixson's second term as sheriff, in 1891, Mr. Yeager served a year as deputy, and when J. B. Pence became sheriff, in January, 1892, Mr. Yeager was made his outside deputy, serving three and one-half years. In March, 1892, Mr. Yeager became jailer, and had charge of the jail for almost three years.

Mr. Yeager's service in the civil war dated from April 1, 1864, when he enlisted at Davenport in the Twenty-sixth Iowa. He was assigned to driving a team and building barracks in Tennessee, where he contracted typhoid fever and was for several weeks in a hospital at Nashville. He was discharged July 29, 1864, at Nashville, and on Oct. 4 of that year was at Davenport, enlisted in Company B, Fifteenth Iowa Infantry. His final discharge was on July 24, 1865, at Louisville, Ky.

Parents of Nine Children. Mr. and Mrs. Yeager became the parents of nine children, four of whom are living. They also have fifteen grandchildren. The living children are Albert Yeager, of Grundy Center; William Yeager, of White Rock, S. D.; Mrs. Lillian Moehrl, of this city; and Clarence Yeager, of Ottumwa. The children who are dead were Leona, who became Mrs. H. H. Crawford, and who died in 1910; Maggie, who became Mrs. Charles Cunningham, and who died in 1909; Ethel, who died in 1902; Claude, who died in 1908, and Agatha, who died at the age of 5 in 1912.
