BIG GROWTH SHOWN IN COUNTY Y. M. C. A.

FIRST ANNUAL BANQUET PROVES SUCCESS OF PAST YEAR'S EFFORTS.

NEW YORK MAN NAMED AS SUCCESSOR TO A. R. SIEBENS

Three County Committeemen Re-elected and Three New Ones Named—Groups Are All Represented and Tell of Work Done—State Officers Speak—Siebens Given Gift.

Announcement of a new secretary for Marshall county Y. M. C. A. work, election of new members for the county committee, and the unequalled success of the work in the county during the first year of its existence, were all brought out at the first annual banquet of the county workers, held at the Y. M. C. A. building Thursday evening. About fifty of the county leaders, representatives from each group, and older men from towns in the county, were present. Supper was served by the Ladies' Auxiliary.

Talks by C. H. Piper, state county work secretary, and W. M. Parsons, state secretary, and the general review of the year's work constituted the most important events of the evening.

York State Man Coming. The new county work secretary, as announced by Mr. Piper, will be Frank P. Harris of Watertown, N. J., who will take up the work at once. Harris has had fifteen years of experience in religious work, and is said to be well qualified to take up the task of keeping the county organizations together.

Robert Harper, of Marietta, chairman of the county committee, acted as toastmaster. The treasurer's report, read by John Witzelsman, of Conrad, showed that the financial end of the work had not suffered during the year. Talks were given then by Messrs. Parsons and Piper, who told of what county work meant, and how to get the most out of it. Other speakers were Dr. G. M. Johnson, president of the city association board of directors, and Secretary John B. Northcutt. Several of the boys spoke also, relating their experiences in the different groups, and showing how each had grown from a few boys, unorganized, to well-formed groups, accomplishing much.

Election of Committeemen. C. E. Arney, J. O. Bissett and A. H. Rice were re-elected to succeed themselves on the county committee. E. E. Lister, of Liacomb, and Harry Moninger, of Hartland, were chosen as new members, and John Brennan, of Green Mountain, was elected to succeed Roy Grimes, resigned. A vote of thanks was also extended to the city association for the use of the building, and to the ladies who served the meal.

Present Siebens With Gift. At the close of the program, the toastmaster presented Mr. Siebens, county secretary, with a traveling bag, a gift from members of all the county groups. Mr. Siebens leaves Sunday for his home at Minonk, Ill., and will go from there to New York City, where he sails on Oct. 7 for Bremen. Siebens will take up Y. M. C. A. relief work in the war zone.

Mr. Harris comes here from several years' experience as organizer in an insurance company, and has had great success in getting men and young men together into groups for organization purposes. He has also been ordained as a minister in the Methodist church, but has not been active in this work for some years. He is a graduate of Wesleyan University, at Middletown, Conn., and has taught public speaking in several schools in the east. Mr. Harris will arrive about Oct. 19.

RED CROSS MEETING FAILS. Attendance at Meeting For Thursday Is Nil. Red Cross activities in Marshalltown were likely to be conspicuous by their absence, if the attendance at the meeting called at the Marshalltown Club Thursday night is any criterion of the interest with which the work is regarded in this city.

S. A. Bowling, of Chicago, organizer from the central department was there, and so was the janitor, and two club members were playing. Otherwise not a soul showed up for the meeting, which had been given publicity thru the newspaper, and which had also been brought to the attention of thirty-five individuals by telephons as late as Thursday morning. A majority of these people said they would be at the meeting. Mr. Bowling waited until after 9 o'clock, and then gave it up. He said it was the first time in his experience that he had ever been turned-down flat. He left town on the first train.

NAREY CASE AFFIRMED. Action Appealed by Railroad Company Falls in Supreme Court.

The supreme court today announced the affirming of the judgment of the district court of this county in the case of Elbert J. Narey vs. the Minneapolis & St. Louis railway. Narey was burned on Aug. 20, 1912, when a torch, with which he was working under an engine in the M. & St. L. round house, exploded. The young man was burned about the head, face, and left hand. He brought an action against the railroad company for \$10,000 damages. The case was tried before Judge Cummings in the district court in 1914, and a jury awarded the plaintiff a judgment of \$1,000 on March 28.


