Y. M. C. A. CAMPAIGN NETS GOOD RESULTS

NEW MEMBERS NUMBER 160 AND RENEWALS NUMBER TO 168 IN ONE DAY.
TOTAL OF 400 MEMBERS IS HOPED FOR BY SATURDAY

Jasper Fisher's Team Leads Day's Work With Ninety-Five Points—Results Are Conceded Satisfactory by All Concerned—Joint Open House With Y. W. C. A. Soon.

An effort which netted good results in new members and a showing regarded as satisfactory all around, was made in the one-day membership campaign conducted by the Y. M. C. A. Wednesday. A total of 328 members was secured, 160 of which were new, and 168 renewals. This does not include many renewals which have been promised during the next few days, but which did not count in on the one day's campaign.

That this showing is extremely successful, and that it shows plainly that the people regard the Y. M. C. A. as their own property, was the statement of Secretary Northcott today. Good, hard work was put in by the various teams and captains throughout the day.

Fisher's Team Leads.
Jasper Fisher's team held the lead which it had at noon and was first at the close of the day with ninety-five points, or thirty-five new members and twenty-five renewals. Perry Rude's team was second, and the others finished in the following order, Albert Hull's and Herman Knudson's teams were tied for third; Fred Wilbur's fifth, J. T. Basham's sixth, George Olson's seventh, and Thomas Stott's eighth.

Still Working Today.
Work will be continued today and all this week on new members and renewals, and it is expected that a total of 400 will be reached by the end of the week. This was the goal set for the campaign, and officers declare that they will be more than pleased if this is reached in a week's time. Reports from other sections of the state indicate that Marshalltown stands alone in cities of Iowa in the support which the business men accord the Y. M. C. A. Not only in a financial way, but by the interest that is taken and the size of the gatherings of all kinds which are held in the building, do the citizens of Marshalltown show their appreciation of the facilities offered by the association.

Joint Open House Soon.
Both the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. will unite in about two weeks for a general housewarming, at which new members, and old members and their families of both organizations will be welcome at the Y. M. C. A. building. Gymnasium classes at the latter opened this noon, and from now on there will be some sort of activity on every night.
