SHALL THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION BE ADOPTED? "Repeal section seven (7) of article two (2) of the constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to-wit: "The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-presidential electors, and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."
