MASON CITY STRIKE OFF.

Brick and Tile Workers Return to Jobs on Advice of Union Official.

Mason City, Nov. 17.—On the advice of J. H. Streif, president of the Iowa Federation of Labor, 600 brick and tile workers at the local plants, who have been on strike, went back to work today, because Streif told them that nothing was to be gained by continuing the strike.

No concessions whatever were made by the employers, it was said. The men struck without consent of the federation officials. Recognition of the union, higher pay and a guarantee against cutting of their wages, during the winter months was demanded by the men.

Most of the camps had reopened today before the union ordered the men to resume work, it was said.

Investigation Increased Fruit Prices.
Washington, Nov. 17.—Investigation of increased fruit prices is being considered at the federal trade commission and the commission's counsel has been directed to inquire into the powers and functions of the commission on the subject. The action was taken by Chairman Burley, who returned today from a trip in the west.

BANDITS MASSACRE CHINESE.

Twenty-Five Orientals Murdered by Villa Band Near Santa Rosalia, Laredo, Tex., Nov. 17.—Twenty-five Chinese were murdered by Villa bandits near Santa Rosalia, Mexico, a few days ago, according to an American who arrived here today from Durango. The bandits have recently been making numerous attacks on Chinese, Spaniards and Syrians, he said.

Amputation of the ears of prisoners by Villa, the American says, is a common happening.

Villa Selects Winter Camp.
Columbus, N. M., Nov. 17.—Francisco Villa and his bandits may remain in Southern Chihuahua for the winter, Mexican refugees from Acsona, who have arrived here, say. These refugees claim to have received their information regarding Villa's plans from the wives of Villa bandits.

These women, it is declared, say Villa is watching the movements of the punitive expedition closely, and will move north and occupy the positions held by the American troops should they leave the country.
