ARIZONA GOES INTO DRYDOCK

The dreadnought Arizona has been placed in drydock in the New York navy yard for repairs to one of her turbines, damaged during her recent cruise off the southern coast. Before going to the navy yard the Arizona was at Tanciler sound, engaged in preliminary target practice. From Tanciler sound she was sent to the New York navy yard for repairs to the damaged turbine. It will require fully a month to make the repairs, it was reported in one account, but others asserted that a much longer time would be required. The Arizona and the Pennsylvania are the latest and largest of American dreadnoughts, and each has a displacement of 31,000 tons, three times as great as that of the Oregon, the "pride of the navy," in the Spanish American war. Captain J. D. McDonald commands the Arizona. The vessel is seen in the picture entering the drydock.
