Oldest Son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Schmidt Dies in Chicago.

Death at 8:25 Wednesday night, claimed Otto C. Schmidt, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Schmidt, 118 North Second street. According to information received from Chicago Mr. Schmidt's death was due to Bright's disease and dropsy. He had been failing in health for a year or more.
