

Civil War Premium on Gold.
Premium on gold for August, 1864, ranged from 231 1/2 to 261 1/2. During the year the premium ranged from nearly the lowest 151, the highest in July, 258; the highest point in 84 was reached on July 1, 289. When on the repeal of the gold bill it immediately declined to 230 1/2, rising again on the 11th to 284 1/2 and again receding to 244 1/2 the middle of the month. The greatest variations were in June, July and September for the year 1864.

Mr. Thomas has sold his residence property in Green Mountain to A. H. Rice, who takes possession Sept. 1.





