INCREASE QUOTA OF DRAFTED MEN

ADDITIONAL TEN PER CENT ORDERED TO DES MOINES CANTONMENT.

IOWA'S NEW QUOTA PLACED AT 14,023

Increase Due to Estimate of Ten Per Cent For Rejections of Men Reaching Camp—Plan Movement of New Army at Minimum of Inconvenience to Passenger and Freight Service.

Washington, Aug. 13.—Nearly 16,000 conscripted men from Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, and the Dakotas will arrive at the Des Moines cantonment, Sept. 5. A similar number will follow on Sept. 15; a similar number on Sept. 20, and the remainder of the quotas of the five states will report as soon thereafter as conveniently possible.

This is the official declaration of the war department of Brigadier General Crowder's call of Monday, when he announced that four increments—three of 30 per cent of the quota and the fourth being the remaining 10 per cent—would begin to move to the cantonments throughout the nation on Sept. 5.

The original quotas of the five states whose drafted men will undergo training at the Des Moines cantonment has been increased from the figures originally announced by 10 per cent. This was due to make up for the wastage—refusal or rejection of men when they reach the camp—as the war department estimates that at least 10 per cent of the men who pass the local boards will fail to come up to the standard examination to be given by regular medical officers of the army at the cantonment.

Iowa's New Quota 14,023.

The new quotas, therefore, for the five states, are: Iowa, 14,023; Minnesota, 19,639; Nebraska, 9,003; North Dakota, 6,186; and South Dakota, 2,985. Thirty per cent of these figures are: Iowa, 4,207; Minnesota, 5,892; Nebraska, 2,709; North Dakota, 1,855; and South Dakota, 895, a grand total of 15,745. This total represents the number of men who will arrive at Des Moines in the first increment.

Realizing the great task that they face in moving the new army of the American government to the sixteen cantonments the quartermaster corps of the army and railroad officials have been in conference for more than a week devising the best methods of handling the huge proposition. The outcome of the conferences and plans will be a minimum of inconvenience to the regular passenger and freight traffic, but for a period of at least forty-eight hours there is bound to be some delay to the maintenance of railway schedules.

To move the first third of the national army to the cantonments will take about 326 of the equipment of the 176 railroads to be engaged. War department transportation experts estimate that 18,700 cars will be needed and nearly 1,100 locomotives. Day coaches will be used with possible a few Pullmans for officers and members of local boards who will want to accompany "their men" to the camp. Railroad experts will be assigned to each troop train in order to facilitate the movement of the men. Subsistence of the men will be furnished at various junction points or be taken in baggage cars along with the trains.

RUSH WORK AT CAMP DODGE.

Construction Activity Speeded Up to Have Cantonment Ready Sept. 5. Des Moines, Aug. 15.—Construction activity at Camp Dodge, the Thirteenth division cantonment, has been speeded to capacity in order that everything may be in readiness for the 15,000 drafted men who are to go into training Sept. 5.

The initial contribution of man power from the Dakotas, Minnesota, Nebraska and Iowa will represent one-third of the total quotas of these states for the first war army, in accordance with recent orders of the war department. Now that the exact time the remaining two-thirds will be called to the colors, is known, camp construction is being rushed beyond the necessities for the first 15,000, with a view to completing all buildings as soon as possible.

With the exception, perhaps, of a number of minor buildings, all construction will be completed by Sept. 1, according to the building contractors, if the present working schedule is maintained. Barracks are being constructed at the required rate per day, and supply depots, stables, etc., are spring up rapidly.

Reports to Major M. A. Butler, constructing quartermaster, show the status of construction to be about as follows: Barracks virtually completed number 156; thirty-eight more to be built. Fifty per cent of 1,576 buildings, which include all main structures, entirely constructed.

Sixty per cent of all road work done; main camp highway graded and 25 per cent surfaced with cement. There are twenty miles of camp roads. Fifteen per cent of 135,000 feet of sewer system and 155,000 foot water system completed; 1,000,000 gallon reservoir half completed.

Twenty-five per cent of ten miles of pole lines for electric lighting system completed. Seven miles of trackage planned in connection with camp entirely completed.

Nearly 5,000 workmen are hurrying the work to completion, and if it becomes necessary, more will be added. Contractors believe the present force will be sufficient to finish the camp in due time.

Plans are being completed for the care of a few thousand new officers, commissioned from government training camps, who are expected to arrive two weeks before the first body of prospective soldiers.

With the arrival of the drafted men, the work of molding them into component parts of the first war army will begin. The routine of training will be much the same as that pursued in the officers' training camps this summer during the first month, according to federal army officers stationed here.

He is held under bond of \$500 by United States Commissioner Bush. Muncy is deputy state fish and game warden here. If convicted he will lose his star.

TO RECRUIT THIRD IOWA TO 3,602 MEN

GUARD REGIMENT ORDERED TO FRANCE TO BE BROUGHT UP TO WAR STRENGTH.

DRAFT 1,600 MEN FROM OTHER IOWA REGIMENTS

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Officers do not say how soon the Third Iowa will be on its way to France but all signs point to a comparatively early departure. It has been reported unofficially here that it will be within two weeks. The companies are fairly well equipped. The regiment is to be increased by drafting 1,600 soldiers from the ranks of the First and Second regiments of the guard, bringing the fighting strength of the Third to 3,602 men and officers. The announcement as given out officially from the war department was that this division "will be sent abroad."

Included in "Rainbow Division." The Third regiment will be a unit in the Eighty-fourth infantry brigade under the command of Brigadier General Mann. This is known as the "Rainbow Division" and will be 19,000 strong and will include national guard units from New York to California.

The third regiment is now under the command of Col. E. E. Bennett, of Des Moines, who saw service in the Spanish-American war. In the Philippines and was in command of the Third regiment in the third regiment are the following: Company A, Winterset, Capt. C. W. Atkins, commanding.
