MARSHALLTOWN MEN CHOSEN FOR DUTIES AT THIRTEENTH DISTRICT CANTONMENT.

CHURCH GIVES REV. MR. LINN SIX MONTHS' LEAVE

Gilman Becomes Physical Work Secretary at Camp Dodge, Des Moines—To Report Latter Part of This Week or Early Next Week.

Two Marshalltown men, C. E. Gilman, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., and Rev. James P. Linn, pastor of the Presbyterian church, were chosen Saturday to become secretaries in the army Y. M. C. A. work for the thirteenth district cantonment at Camp Dodge, Des Moines.

To Work With 5,000 Men. In the cantonment there will be nine groups of 5,000 men each and each in charge of six Y. M. C. A. men. A general secretary, religious work secretary, educational secretary, physical secretary and two assistants will make up the Y. M. C. A. contingent of officers for each group.

HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO IN MARSHALLTOWN

Friday, Aug. 19, 1892.

"Superintendent McFarland, of the telephone company, and assistants, put up the first cable last night, working till quite late. The cable contains 102 wires, and extends from the main office in the First National Bank building, west along the alley to a point between Center and First streets, where the wires are distributed.

"A letter received by Miss Nettie Brown brings the sad intelligence that Mr. Ralph McCracken died a few days ago at Denver of hemorrhage of the lungs. Ralph was a son of Mr. T. E. McCracken, once a citizen and newspaper man of Marshalltown, whom old residents will remember."

"Marshall county veterans held their annual picnic at the soldiers home, 1,500 people being in attendance. Addresses were made by Senator Engle, of Brunswick; Rev. G. F. DeVal, of Jostow, and T. O. Walker, of this city. Letters expressing regret that they could not be in attendance were read from Senators Allison, ex-Senator James Harlan and Congressman D. B. Henderson and W. P. Heppburn.

"Mr. Al Edwards' little daughter Annie met with a very serious accident yesterday evening. Her little brother Roy had been drawing water from a cistern and left the manhole open, the little girl came running out of the house and not seeing the opening ran into it, falling into the cistern below. An old fork that was on the bottom was run into her foot, making a dangerous wound that penetrated quite deeply."

"D. W. Blair, of Rochester, N. Y., stealing a ride on a Chicago Great Western train while on his way from Des Moines to Independence, had his left leg crushed when he attempted to board the train at the station here. He was taken to the Satio House, where Drs. F. H. Boucher and H. L. Getz amputated the leg four inches below the knee."

"The annual picnic of the Marshalltown traveling men was held at Eldora with a thousand or more, including members of families, in attendance. Addresses were made by F. C. Letts, of this city, and Mayor G. E. McFall, of Oskaloosa. Upon the return of the special train to this city the traveling men marched in a body to the home of Traffic Manager A. F. Banks, of the Iowa Central, and presented him with a set of china dishes."

"Mrs. Della White, aged 81, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. J. Holt, in Vienna township. Mrs. White also was the mother of William White, of Green Mountain."

"Mrs. Sarah M. Ellsworth, aged 43, died at her home, 22 North First street, of consumption. She had been ill more than a year. She was survived by her daughter, Nellie Ellsworth, and two sons, Lee Ellsworth and Frank Stanton."

"A fine pedigreed bull belonging to Alvin Cole was chased by dogs Saturday until he became overheated and yesterday went crazy from the effects of the chase. He broke out of the barn, and for fear he would harm some one or other cattle, Mr. Cole elected to shoot him. Joe Finkerton climbed upon the barn with a 32-caliber Winchester rifle, and if you are anxious to know how many shots it took to fell the animal, ask him."

"Jonathan H. Voorhies, aged 69, and an old resident of Marshalltown, died at his home, 308 South First avenue, of kidney disease. He was a native of New Jersey, having been born at Rahway, Jan. 13, 1823. He was united in marriage with Esther J. Barrett, Aug. 30, 1846, and came to Tama county in June 1852, making his home on a farm. Later he engaged in the hotel business at Indian Town, hauling his supplies from Iowa City by ox team. In 1864 he moved to Colo and became agent of the Northwestern railway, a position he held for twelve years. He came to Mar-

shalltown in 1878 and in 1883 was elected a member of the city council from the Fourth ward, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John Turner. Mr. Voorhies was re-elected to the council in 1885. He was a member of the Methodist church and the Masonic fraternity. In addition to his widow he was survived by three sons and three daughters, in the persons of R. B. Voorhies, Glendive, Mont., a conductor on the Northern Pacific railway; W. H. Voorhies, of this city, trainmaster of the Iowa Central; Mrs. Emma Jewell, of this city; Mrs. Mary Sanders and Mrs. F. M. Chapman, of this city. Two children had preceded their father to the grave."

"William H. Farrand, aged 40, died at his home, 206 North Fourth street, of tumor of the stomach, following an illness of several months. He was the senior member of the retail clothing firm of Farrand, Smith & Gifford. He was survived by his wife and one daughter, Grace. The body was taken to Columbiana, O., for burial."

"Master Luther McCordell entertained his little friends at his home on North First street last evening by a magic lantern exhibition and proved himself to be a good showman."

"Byron J. Allen, of Pocahontas, a native of this county, and son of D. J. Allen, of Pocahontas, formerly owner of the Governor Packard farm, west of town, died at Fore Dodge after a brief illness of stomach trouble. Mr. Allen was born in this county, June 30, 1852, and as a young man studied law in the office of Caswell & Meeker. Later he attended the law department of the state university. He was united in marriage with Miss Anna Jackson, of Laurens, in 1889, engaged in the practice of law at Laurens, and later moved to Pocahontas, where he opened a law office, real estate and banking business. He was also county attorney of Pocahontas county. He was survived by his widow and one little daughter. The body was brought to this city for burial, services being held from the home of Mr. Allen's uncle, Joseph Holmes, in charge of Revs. S. F. Strout and Benjamin Nichols, ministers of the Society of Friends. Mr. Allen's father, D. J. Allen, was unable to be present at the funeral owing to the serious illness of his son Joseph. (Senator Joseph Allen, of Pocahontas)."

"Mrs. Wallace Doty, aged 24, died at her home, 409 North Fourth street, of blood poisoning, following the birth of her baby one week before. Mrs. Doty was a daughter of Delos W. Vail. Mr. and Mrs. Harlan came here to make their home at 107 West Lincoln street."
