MANY NEW CASES FOR COURT TERM ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY-SEVEN ACTIONS FILED FOR COMMING SESSION.

MORE THAN SCORE ARE BEGUN ON LAST DAY Several Actions Against Railroad Companies For Damage and Loss of Property—City Defendant in One Action—Summary of Other Cases Filed on Last Day.

One hundred seventy-seven new cases had been filed for the September term of the district court, which opens Sept. 3, when the time for filing petitions closed Friday evening.

Included in the last fifteen actions filed late Friday were seven cases against railroads for loss of property and for personal injury, one against the city, and several others based on actions on contracts and notes.

Among the railroad cases are two brought for George F. Smith and his minor son Claude against the M. & St. L., in which claim is made for \$12,900. The cause for these suits was the accident at the Twelfth street crossing July 15, 1916, when Smith's automobile collided with a work train.

Other Railroad Cases. August Osterhagen of Melbourne, has filed suit against the C. M. & St. P. for \$197.60, alleged damage sustained by delay of a shipment of cattle from Melbourne to Chicago.

City Is Defendant. The city is made defendant in an action begun by W. B. Hassler, who owns a residence property at Sixteenth and Main streets. It is alleged the city water department opened a fire hydrant near Hassler's home and that the water flooded the lot and caused the foundation of the house to crack and settle besides doing other damage.

Other Petitions Filed. Bradford and Johnson have filed suit against George W. Smith, et al., on an assigned claim of Torey Mayhews, whose property was attached by Smith, it is alleged. The attachment was without warrant, the petition avers, and resulted in damage to Mayhew of \$100.
