

TO MARK SUPPOSED GRAVE OF INDIAN

COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY AWARDS CONTRACT FOR GRANITE MONUMENT.

HONORS "JOHNNY" GREEN, POTTAWATTAMIE CHIEFTAN

Friend of Early White Settlers of County to Live in Memory of Generations to Come—Some Doubt as to Just Where Green's Bones Actually Lie at Present Time.

In an effort to perpetuate the memory of "Johnny" Green, the Pottawattamie Indian chief who befriended the early white settlers of this county against depredations by the Sioux and other unfriendly red men, the Historical Society of Marshall County Monday let a contract for the erection of a monument to the old Indian.

Although there is much uncertainty as to just where Green's bones now lie, the society expects to have the monument placed on the bluff north and east of the soldiers' home commandant's residence, overlooking the Iowa river. Green was buried on this bluff, but whether the bones still are bleaching in the grave they originally occupied, there is a question.

Say Body Was Moved. Following the movement seven years ago to create an interest in the marking of Green's grave, said to have been on the bluff northeast of the home grounds, the Times-Republican was informed that Indians, relatives of Green, had moved the body after it had been buried, because of rumors to the effect that the grave had been tampered with. This probably could be verified possibly by the society thru John McIntosh, Green's son-in-law or other relatives now living at the Meskwaki reservation near Tama.

President J. M. Parker, of the society, was in favor of digging down at the spot believed to contain Green's grave and find out for sure whether or not there were any indications of the Indian's last resting place. Men of today, who were boys in 1848 and were at Green's burial, know that Green's body was buried on the river bluff. However, they differ as to the exact spot. No one appears to know for sure whether the body was removed.

Marker of Granite. The monument to be erected for Green is to be of Barre granite, four feet in height, and three and one-half feet across the base. It will weigh 2,000 pounds and cost the society \$170. The contract was let to Herter & Leins.

On the monument will be inscribed the chief's name, with the words "The Friend of the White Man"; the date of his birth, 1795, and date of death, 1863. It is likely the monument will be unveiled in May.

MRS. AUGUSTA RICHEY DEAD.

Widow of Irvin Richey Dies of Paralysis at County Hospital.

Mrs. Augusta Richey, aged 56, widow of Irvin Richey, died at the county hospital at 7:30 this morning of apoplexy, with which she was stricken two weeks ago. Mrs. Richey was first stricken with an attack about fifteen years ago. Since the death of her husband ten years ago Mrs. Richey made her home with her sister, Mrs. H. Mead, 1510 West Linn street, up to May 7, when she was removed to the county hospital.

Mrs. Richey's maiden name was Scott. She was born in Albion, a daughter of the late J. L. Scott, and married in Elkhart. As a young woman she was well known as a singer, and sang in the choir of the Methodist and other churches here.

In addition to Mrs. Mead two other sisters and one brother survive her.

They are Mrs. Emma Quigley, of Medford, Okla.; Mrs. Eva H. of Chehalis, Wash., and George Scott, whose address is not known.
