### POLICE IDENTIFY SOLDIER BANDIT

CLAIM TO KNOW CAMP DODGE MAN WHO ROBBED BANK AND NUMEROUS CITIZENS.

CHARLES SINGLETON, COOK, SOUGHT BY OFFICIALS

Has Been Absent Without Leave For Twelve Days—Clothing Found at Perry With Package of Bills Stolen From Bank—Three Civilians Held as Suspected Accomplices.

Des Moines, Jan. 23.—Police say they know who the soldier bandit is. He is Charles Singleton, member of the cooks and bakers' school at Camp Dodge, they say.

Singleton has been absent without leave from the camp twelve days. He has returned but says then to rent an overcoat from Private Moran of the same organization. He paid Moran \$20 for the use of the coat for three days.

Singleton's coat was found last night at the corner of Thirty-ninth and Center streets in a hollow. It was identified by its initials written on the inside.

Moran's coat was found at Perry, Iowa, in a rooming house yesterday. In the pockets were \$40 in bills bound with a hand on which was printed "Cottage Grove Bank." Moran yesterday identified the coat.

Bought Suit at Perry. Information from Perry says the man who left the overcoat bought civilian clothes at Perry, paying for them in half dollars and took a train, saying he was going to Chicago.

Three civilians are being held as suspected accomplices of the soldier bandit who after terrifying the city with a series of daring holdups that culminated in the daylight robbery of the Cottage Grove bank, escaped and Wednesday night returned to hold up four more persons while military and city police ran in circles mystified at the rapidity of his work.

The men are: William Dodson and W. L. Wickersham, arrested, 907 Walnut street and Pete Carter taken at his mother's home, 1149 Seventeenth street.

Found Money in Mattress. When Detectives Pettit, Trimble and Delmege yesterday arrested Dodson and Wickersham they found that the men had more than \$100 in bills concealed beneath the mattress in their room. Dodson had a .45 caliber revolver. A military uniform was found in a trunk in the room. It was stained with blood or grease. The uniform was brought to the police by a man who said he had found it in a trunk in the room.

Carter was arrested on information furnished to the police by a taxi-cab driver, W. F. Binford, who said Carter came to him on the night of the Prime drug store on Park avenue hold-up and asked him to drive him and a soldier to the Prime store.

Carter was unable to account for his actions before 11 o'clock Wednesday night. He said he did not work, but made his living shooting craps and playing pool.

He told Binford that he was arrested in connection with the bank hold-up. "They want me for that bank job," he said to his mother as police led him from the house.

Singleton Desperate. "Singleton is crazy and desperate. Shoot him on sight and shoot to kill," were the instructions given to policemen yesterday by Chief Jackson. "There is no doubt but Singleton is the man we want," the chief told a reporter yesterday. "It is only a question of killing or capturing him before he kills someone. The city should offer a reward for his capture."

Mayor MacVicar said it was not in the power of the city to offer rewards but that if Superintendent of Public Safety Woolgar would bring the matter before the council a way might be found to offer one.

W. O. Furman was the first man to be held up by the soldier bandit Wednesday night.

Held Up Automobile. Furman told police that as he crossed Grand avenue at Twenty-fourth street the bandits a soldier and a civilian, jumped before his car and ordered him to stop. Furman sped up his car and passed the men as a volley of bullets struck over his head. One bullet struck an extra casing in the rear of the car. Furman's wife and daughter were with him at the time of the attempted holdup.

Paul Prush and Irl H. Marshall were held up the same men on Drake university campus an hour later. Marshall defied the civilian who threatened him with a revolver and ran to the Gamma Sigma Chi fraternity house for aid.

When he returned with two companions he found that the holdups had tracked Prush into the shadow of the little college and robbed him of his watch and \$9.

### FIRE SHOT INTO AUTO.

Hastings Resident, Crazy by Liquor, Wounds Woman and Child. Hastings, Jan. 23.—A shooting affray, declared to be the result of the use of liquor, has excited the people of this community who are demanding the arrest of the persons who have been boistering in this section, and their severe punishment.

It is said, by liquor of which he had never been a great user, Ed Warren emptied the contents of a shotgun into an automobile occupied by Arthur Smith, Mrs. Smith and two children. Mrs. Smith was holding the youngest child in her lap. The shot entered her face and head and with the blood streaming from her and covering the 2-year-old boy, who was also grazed by some of the shot, the auto was quickly driven to the drug store in Hastings, where Dr. Christy gave them in detail attention. The little girl, 6 years of age, was also hit by some of the shot but Mr. Smith escaped. All were dazed by the sudden and unexpected attack, not knowing its cause, and it was some minutes before Mr. Smith could sense the situation and when he did he drove with all haste to town.

It appears that the family of Warren had taken refuge in the home of Nick Hodge when Warren appeared at home, grazed and were followed there by Warren, who demanded their return home. Warren was ordered from the place and left, muttering vengeance. On his return with the shotgun the Smiths were just getting into their car and drew the attention and fire of Warren's shotgun.

### LIFE TERM FOR NEGRO RAPIST

GRINNELL MAN WHO ASSAULTED TWO LITTLE GIRLS GIVEN MAXIMUM PENALTY.

M'CLURE SENTENCED TO FIFTEEN YEARS FOR FORGERY

Colored Woman Who Killed Man During Drunken Brawl at Brooklyn Sent to Prison For Eight Years—Large Number of Criminal Cases Disposed of in Poweshiek County Court.

Special to Times-Republican. Montezuma, Jan. 23.—More criminal business has been disposed of during the past few days than for a long while. An assignment of criminal cases was set for this week. All of them have been disposed of and only one went to a jury.

The one jury trial was that of Leroy McCluskey, who was charged with manslaughter, he having run over and killed a little girl as he was driving along the highway near Brooklyn. The speed of the car was in dispute and some of the testimony was to the effect that the little one ran in front of the car after she had seen it approaching. The jury was out on the case about an hour, returning a verdict of not guilty.

A life sentence was given Frank Fields, colored, of Grinnell, who was indicted on two counts charging him with the rape of two little girls, colored, aged about 10 years. He did not stand trial but entered a plea of guilty as charged.

Fifteen years at Anamosa was given the forger, McClure, who presented checks purporting to have been drawn by Vernon Ross, of Malcom, at the Malcom and Brooklyn banks. He drove to Grinnell, evidently trying to get away from the county on the first train, but was found there and placed under arrest. He also waived trial and was sentenced in short order.

The colored woman, Genevieve Davis, indicted for murder and who pleaded guilty to manslaughter, was sent to Anamosa for a term of eight years. She shot a local character at Brooklyn in some kind of a drunken brawl. Her consort, Bannon, received a sentence of \$300 for bootlegging and will board out his term.

A Belgian, Emil DeRycke, ran away with a young girl some months ago and was indicted on a charge of abduction and of criminal assault. He pleaded guilty to the first and the second was dismissed. He was fined \$100 and costs. Earlier in the day he had been before the court seeking to have his final papers as a citizen issued to him but when the fact developed that he was under indictment the court dismissed his application for naturalization.

Fred Taylor and Charles Sanders drew fines of \$200 for bootlegging in the north part of the county. They will work out their sentences in the county jail.

No Citizenship For Slackers. Judge Wilcockson was very careful to examine the would-be citizens as to their support of the government in the purchase of liberty bonds and contributions to the Red Cross. Especially did he press these questions home to the Belgians seeking their final papers. Not a one of them had contributed anything. Edith said that no one had asked them to contribute. One said that he had been in the cornfield for the past two months and had not seen any one of the canvassers. It appeared that one at least had accumulated quite a little property in the twelve years he had been in this vicinity and the court was very severe in its criticism of him and his friends who had not done anything to help this government especially when it was their mother country that we are now fighting for. Naturalization was denied to Peter Verbiest partly for the reasons stated and partly because he had not acquainted himself with the simplest facts about the government he sought to become a part of and knew nothing of the elementary facts about its history. The comments of the court were very caustic and appealed strongly to the crowd in the court room. Incidentally it developed that the candidate for citizenship who was denied his papers has two or more sons who are now man grown, one of them being in the draft, who can neither read or write.

A new assignment of jury cases was made and the jury ordered to report next Wednesday instead of on Monday, as planned before.

### WITH THE SOLDIERS AT CAMP

Camp Dodge, Jan. 23.—War insurance to the amount of \$157,411,000 has been taken out by officers and men at this cantonment and policies protecting a total of 16,942 men have been written.

The reports made to Capt. Paul R. Morrissey, division insurance officer, show that more than 90 per cent of the men now in camp have taken out policies, the average amount of which is \$9,278.

These figures will be revised later, as in some of the units policies taken out by men who have since been transferred to Camp Pike are included in the total sum reported.

The Three Hundred Fifth Infantry, the northern Iowa unit, has taken \$3,172,500 in insurance, and the Three Hundred Thirty-ninth field artillery has taken out \$7,374,500. This organization includes most of the southern Iowa soldiers in camp. It is hoped to bring the organization to the 100 per cent mark by Feb. 1, with all men either being insured or having signed a statement that they do not desire insurance.

The Three Hundred Sixty-sixth infantry, the negro unit, made the largest increase of any organization last week. A total of 2,812 policies have been written in that regiment for a total of \$13,458,000. Practically every negro soldier has taken out a policy immediately after the nature of the proposition was explained to him.

Students in the officers' training school at Camp Dodge are at top speed in the third week of the course under Lieut. Col. R. B. Parrott, commandant, Monday.

Even Sundays are not to be full holidays now on for the men who have been selected to try for commissions in Uncle Sam's national army. From 7 until 9 p. m. Sunday the men are required to be present for a study period which includes infantry drill regulations, notes on bayonet training and on grenade warfare. The students and instructors are hoping for continued mild weather for the work.

It was found that too many students were enrolled to gain the highest degree with the formation of two infantry companies, so a third has been formed. There still remains the one battery of aspirants for commissions in the field artillery.

Study of rifle grenade bombing and bayonet training, with two-hour periods when conferences and study of infantry and drill regulations and the notes which have been taken during lectures are being held.

There is but little sickness among the student officers and work is progressing rapidly.

Artillerymen at this cantonment are becoming accustomed to the boom of the three inch field pieces on the artillery range where they have been practicing for some time.

A battery of three inch field pieces is in action almost daily on the range. The sharp boom of the gun, followed by the crisp splitting of the air by the shell and the dull plop a couple miles away as the shell bursts in a puff of white smoke are giving the cows and chickens of the farmyards some new and unfamiliar sights and sounds, but each day the officers manning the guns are finding the ranges quicker and locating the targets easier.

Almost all officers in the artillery brigade are turning out to witness the an opportunity to handle the guns. Details from the artillery regiments are drawn up to witness the practice, and before the shooting is over, as well as after it begins, lectures are given the officers and men upon the lessons to be learned from the actual operation of the guns.

The guns used, American three-inch field pieces, are similar in all important respects to the famous French 75's which turned back the Huns at the Marne early in the war. They are modest looking weapons. The guns themselves, as well as the carriages

and caissons, are painted an iron gray, and the only bright metal seen is that of the brass shell cases.
