QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT INCOME TAX

Q—I am a married man and have two children under 18. My income in 1917 was \$2,400. Do I have to schedule to pay?

A—Yes, but you will have no tax to pay.

Q—I am married, have no regular income, and my fees from clients in 1917 averaged less than \$1,800; office upkeep about \$200. Am I required to file an income tax report?

A—If your net income is less than \$2,000 no report is required.

Q—I earned in 1917 a salary of \$1,600 and my wife taught a public school, earning \$500. We rent our home and partly support her mother. Should I make a return and pay income tax?

A—Your wife's income as a public school teacher is exempt. Your income without this is less than \$2,000, therefore no return is necessary.

Q—A farmer sells his farm and holds a sale, disposing of farm implements, horses, cattle, hay, hogs, and other farm equipment. The implements were bought during a period of twenty-five years. What part of above is subject to income tax?

A—The part you figure as gain or profit between fair market value on March 1, 1913, and the selling price.

Q—I sold my farm, stock, and machinery in 1918. Will the amount to be taxed be put on the schedule to be paid in 1919?

A—Yes, schedule for 1918, the year paid.

Q—The 3 1/2 per cent Liberty bonds of 1917, as I understand it, are exempt from all income taxes, yet I find in form 1040-A no place to show exemption for purchase of these bonds. In making return am I entitled to exemption of the amount of 3 1/2 per cent bonds I purchased?

A—No; this is capital invested.

Q—My brother and I support our widowed mother and unmarried sister, who are without income. Our combined income for 1917 was about \$2,100. What exemption are we entitled to?

A—The separate returns; each is entitled to \$1,000 exemption if unmarried.

Notice of Amendment to Articles of Incorporation of the Lennox Furze Company

We, D. W. Norris, Jr., and H. A. Kinnaman, president and secretary and treasurer, respectively, of The Lennox Furze Company, a corporation with its principal place of business at Marshalltown, Iowa, whose names are hereunto subscribed, in conformity with and in pursuance of due authority and direction given by the stockholders of said corporation, in special meeting assembled, do hereby amend Article III of the Articles of Incorporation of the said Article III, as heretofore amended, the following:

ARTICLE III

The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) divided into shares of one hundred dollars (\$100) each, four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) of such capital stock to be common stock and one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of such capital stock to be preferred stock.

All stock issued shall be fully paid up in money or property when issued, as provided by the laws of Iowa, and shall be non-assessable and can be transferred on the books of the corporation only upon surrender of original certificate.

The earnings of said preferred stock of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) shall not exceed seven per cent per annum out of the net profits, but said preferred stock shall be cumulative and shall be preferred, both as to dividends (not to exceed 7 per cent per annum), and preferred as to the assets of said company.

Dividends shall be declared upon outstanding preferred stock semi-annually, and payable March 1st and September 1st of each year.


