WIFE OF PHILIPPINES' FORMER GOVERNOR SUES FOR A DIVORCE

Mrs. Francis Burton Harrison, wife of the former governor general of the Philippines, has filed divorce papers alleging cruelty at the office of the county clerk. Mrs. Harrison has been living at the fashionable Hotel del Coronado since her arrival in San Diego early in the winter. Before her marriage to Harrison in 1907 Mrs. Harrison was Miss Catherine Judson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry I. Judson, of Brooklyn. She has retained the services of a prominent New York lawyer, whose name has not been disclosed, who with Judge Campbell, of San Diego, Cal., will present her case when it comes up in the superior court next month. Previous to his marriage to Miss Judson, Harrison had been married to Miss Mary Crocker, of San Francisco, who died in 1905. He was appointed governor general of the Philippines in 1913. Before that he had been five times member of congress and in 1904 he was the democratic nominee for lieutenant governor of New York.
