Word received by telegram Friday by Mrs. Charles B. Rogers told of the sudden death Thursday of her brother-in-law, Edgar Malcolm Rogers, formerly of this city. No particulars of the death were stated in the message. Mr. Rogers was the next youngest son of Charles O. Rogers, a former resident of this city, and spent much of his boyhood here. The family moved to New Orleans several years ago. Since attaining manhood Edgar Rogers had been connected with a wholesale ship chandlers' concern, of which he was one of the directors. His is the first death among the family of children. In addition to his wife Mr. Rogers is survived by two little daughters. There are living besides the father four brothers and two sisters. They are Scott M. Rogers, of Chicago; Miss Alice Rogers of New Orleans; Charles B.
