# WOUNDED YANKS NEED MAGAZINES

### GREATEST WANT OF CONVALESCENT IOWANS IS LIGHT READING MATTER.

### VISITOR TO HOSPITALS ISSUES AN APPEAL

### Directs How Magazines Should Be Sent In Bundles For Sick Soldiers at Camp Dodge and Fort Des Moines— Tells of Remarkable Operations— Wounded Man in High Spirits.

Cedar Rapids, Feb. 28.—That the greatest need of Iowa's wounded heroes, who are convalescing at Camp Dodge and Fort Des Moines, is magazines, is a message brought by Mrs. Elizabeth A. Stewart, who has returned from Des Moines, and the two camps.

"The convalescing men feel the want of good magazines," said a librarian at the camp, "they do not care to read books that are long and require serious thought; they like to be amused and entertained by turning thru the pages of a current magazine. If you convey to Cedar Rapids persons that their soldier boys want magazines, you will do us a great favor."

Magazines for the men should be wrapped in packages, and addressed to the librarian, main library, Camp Dodge, Iowa. Sending the periodicals singly has not been found satisfactory. It is announced, as a great many small packages never reach the camp.

Visited Wounded Nephew.

Mrs. Stewart visited her nephew, Ralph Cook, at Camp Dodge. Cook was gassed and wounded in action, and for three weeks he did not speak. He is now well on the way to recovery, according to Mrs. Stewart, who speaks in highest esteem for the work of the army medical officers.

She told how Cook's wounded shoulder was built to health again, and how a bone in his right hand was splined, and several tendons rejoined. After the injury, which was caused by the third finger, which Cook could not straighten. She told of other marvelous surgical operations, including that of one man whom she saw. He told of having suffered a badly crushed leg, and how a piece of bone had been taken out of his left leg, and grafted in the injured leg so that he will be able to walk again.

Wounded in High Spirits.

"Although the sight of the maimed young man is pitiful," said Mrs. Stewart, "I did not leave the hospital with the terrible feeling I had expected to have."

"I was amazed at the spirit of the soldiers," continued Mrs. Stewart. "No matter how badly they were wounded, they are cheerful and the convalescent men are anxious to help those in worse condition. Des Moines women are doing wonderful work to make life more cheerful for the soldiers. They give parties, bring out good things to eat, and do all in their power to make the bedridden and other invalids happy thru their prayers."

# BUILDS PALESTINE RAILWAYS.

### Former Iowa Man Supervising Locomotive Construction of Allies.

Iowa Falls, Feb. 28.—Frank T. Slayton, a former Iowa Falls man, is "doing his bit" in faraway Palestine, where he is supervising the erection of American locomotives used in transportation of troops and supplies for the allied armies. Mr. Slayton is a former Iowa railroad man but for

many years has been in the East. His first work was on the Chicago Great Western, where he rose rapidly in the employ of that company. He was then called to Virginia, where he was superintendent of motive power for the Virginia railway for a number of years. His work in that position attracted the attention of the Baldwin locomotive works of Philadelphia and he was offered a fine position with that big concern. When the war broke out and American locomotives were in demand abroad, Mr. Slayton was sent overseas and friends here have recently received from him photographs of the work he is supervising in putting locomotives in commission in the Holy Land.

# Lesson No. 5 on Income Taxes

Liberal deductions for business expenses are allowed by the new revenue bill.

"Business expenses are the amounts actually paid or incurred during the tax year in the conduct of a business, trade or profession. In computing net income a merchant may find his profits depend on Sloan's Liniment. First ascertain the gross sales and the other items of gross income, such as interest on bank balances and miscellaneous items. Then add together the inventory at the beginning of the year and the cost of the goods purchased for resale. From this sum subtract the inventory at the end of the year, and the result is the cost of the goods sold. This cost, plus necessary expenses is to be deducted from the gross sales and other income, and the result is the net income of the business.

If the taxpayer's accounts are kept on a receipt and payments basis, the return may be made in accordance therewith.

A merchant may claim as deductions the amount paid for advertising, hire of clerks and other employees, the cost of light and fuel, water, telephone, etc., used in his place of business, the cost of operating delivery wagons, motor trucks and incidental repairs to such vehicles.

Amounts expended in entertaining an out-of-town customer may be deducted if the sole purpose is to cultivate the good will of the customer and obtain an increase in trade.

A physician may claim as deductions the cost of medicines and medical supplies used by him in his practice, a reasonable proportion of the expenses paid in the maintenance and repair of an automobile used in making professional calls, the expenses of attending medical conventions, dues to medical societies and subscriptions to medical journals, the rent paid for office rooms, the cost of heat, water, telephone, etc., used in such office rooms and the hire of office assistants. If his office is in a rented home, he may claim as deduction that proportion of the rent properly chargeable to the rooms used for professional purposes. The same deductions are allowed a dentist.

The farmer may deduct all amounts paid in preparing his land for a crop, and the cultivation, harvesting and marketing of the crop. The cost of seed and fertilizer used and the amount spent in caring for live stock are deductible items. The cost of minor repairs, to farm buildings, other than the dwelling, and of fences, farm machinery, and wagons may be also claimed also the cost of farm small hand tools and of materials for immediate use, such as binding twine, stock powders, etc. The cost of machinery of a permanent character, such as threshing machine or tractor is held to be a capital investment, and is not allowable deduction. Deduction

may be made for rent for a farm.

This is a general law, outlines the ordinary expenses incurred by a merchant, professional man or farmer, and the principle underlying these allowances is equally applicable in the conduct of any trade, business or profession. In short, all expenses connected directly and solely with the conduct of an income-producing business, trade, profession or vocation are allowable.
