MRS. E. N. LEPLY DEAD.
 Passed Away at Homestead Occupied More Than Fifty Years.

 Union, April 10.—Mrs. E. N. Leply, one of the best known women of Union and vicinity, died last night at 7 o'clock, of pneumonia. Her death occurred at the home of her son, who occupies the family homestead, which was bought by the senior Leply in 1853 and in which Mr. and Mrs. Leply resided until the death of her husband. Mrs. Leply, during her widowhood had been living in Union, but returned to the old homestead to spend the past winter with her son. She was born in Somerset county, Pennsylvania, March 19, 1843. Six children survive, in the persons of Elliot and Irwin Leply, of Conrad; Samuel Leply, of Gifford; Mrs. Rose McMillan, of Pasadena, Calif.; Peter Leply, of New Providence, and Mrs. Lillie Hutchins, of Deer Trail, Colo. She was a member of the Christian church.
 Funeral services probably will be held Sunday, but arrangements depend upon word from the daughter in California.

Efficient Housekeeping

CHOOSING THE HOME.
 "I am to be married in May and would like some suggestions in regard to choosing our first little home," writes one of my reader friends. "We can only afford to rent a tiny house and I shall do my own work. What do you consider the important points to take into consideration?"
 Plumbing is one of the first things to be thought of, in choosing a home. A house with the old-fashioned, unsanitary plumbing should not be considered.
 A dry cellar is another very important point. A damp cellar with unimproved floor, is a direct path to ill health.
 The house hunter should make sure, too, that the heating apparatus is of the best. For a cold house in winter is a very dangerous thing.
 And of course the lighting system should come in for close and critical inspection, before one decides to rent, as well as the kitchen range, laundry facilities, position of ice box, garbage pail, etc.
 But after these points of sanitation have been covered, what shall we turn our attention to, as the thing next in line of importance? It would be interesting to hear what my various readers would say, if asked this question. I believe that, with the majority, sunshine would be the thing under consideration—as it is with me.
 But here again there would probably be many conflicting opinions. "Sunshine in the living room," some would say. "Sunny bedrooms," others would declare. "A sunlit dining room," still others would insist.

TO PULL NATION OUT OF MUD.

National Highway Council Proposes Wise Expenditure of Millions.
 Chicago, April 10.—The whole country is going to be pulled out of the mud during the reconstruction days if plans laid down Tuesday by the federal highway council, launched by the Congress hotel, are carried to fruition.
 The new organization, which is to act in an advisory capacity to civic and government bodies in all states of the union starts with the indorsement of representatives of 340 agencies which have been urging the building of hard roads.
 The first concerted drive to arouse the country to the proper pitch will be the backing of the Townsend bill now pending in Congress. It provides for an appropriation of \$425,000,000 for national highways. This sum, if set aside by the national lawmakers, is to supplement the state and local bodies which have been working on a scheme of coordination that will link the whole nation in a big highway building drive.
 The Townsend bill appropriation alone would build two sets of highways in every state in the union in addition to the construction work now in progress under state and municipal supervision. By hooking up all these efforts and working to a general plan the backers of the new council believe that the United States, in a very few years, would have the best highway system in the world.
 Of almost as great importance as the highways themselves just at this period would be the opportunity afforded to more than 30,000 workers of the national plan alone. The scope of the undertaking would afford positions for this many employes for a period of several years, and would add that much to the general scheme of supplying employment to returning soldiers and sailors, and thus help to relieve the pressure on the labor market.
 A nation-wide propaganda will be launched at once and then the council
