MARINE STRIKE HITS HOUSEWIFE

TIEUP ON ATLANTIC SEABOARD MAKES SUGAR SCARCE IN THIS CITY.

PRICE ADVANCED; DEALERS PUT LIMIT ON PURCHASES

Price increased to Consumer From 11 to 12 1/2 Cents a Pound and Purchases Limited to \$1 Worth—Increased Consumption Another Cause of Shortage—Situation Seen May Be Relieved.

That the strike, instituted some time ago by the marine unions along the Atlantic seaboard, should have a serious effect for Marshalltown housewives, in spite of the fact that the strike was settled last week, seems impossible.

The direct result of this is felt by the housewife because the jobber is limiting the amount he sells to the grocer and in turn the grocer has had to limit the amount he retails.

According to the figures compiled by the sugar equalization board, the per capita sugar consumption in the United States for the first half of the year shows a gain of four pounds per person over the corresponding period of 1918.

The shortage has pushed up the price 1.5 cents a pound as you have probably noticed if you have bought sugar recently. It retailed today at 12.5 cents and the highest it has been for some time was 11 cents.

Housewives Should Not Hoard. Housewives who have attempted to learn the cause for the limiting of the sugar supply have, in most cases, received an evasive answer as the grocers have feared a true statement of facts might cause a scramble for sugar.

There is no cause for alarm for now that the vessels tied up in port will discharge their cargoes and start immediately for more sugar. It is certain that it will take only a short time to bring about a resumption of a weekly volume of imports equal to that which prevailed prior to the outbreak of the trouble.

Sugar Control of Value. Housewives should be interested to know of what great value the sugar control has been to them. At no time since the period of control began has its value in protecting the consumer been more evident than under existing conditions.

County Attorney Will Assist Autoists to Get Duplicate Number Plates

In the campaign to enforce the law requiring all automobiles to show two license numbers, it has been found that in many cases cars are running with but a single number because the other has been lost.

Autoists who have lost a number may apply to the county attorney, who will assist in the preparation of an affidavit to secure a duplicate number. When such application is made the county attorney will furnish a temporary pastebord number, which is to be displayed on the windshield, showing the owner has taken steps to secure a duplicate plate.

Applicants may make affidavit in the county attorney's office, and if bringing the data and the postal order or check, which goes to the state for the duplicate number, the whole transaction may be closed in a few minutes and a record of it kept.

Telegraph Rates Reduced. In view of the government refunding control over telegraph and telephone lines at midnight Thursday, at least one commodity shows a reduction.

Orders issued all managers of the Postal Telegraph Company effective at midnight Thursday, call for a reduction of 20 per cent in day telegrams and night letters, and the restoration of the old rates on night telegrams. As long as the Postal sent no day letters

until after the government control became effective, it will dispense with this class of business. The company's contention is that the day letter business slows up the service over regular day telegrams.
