HEAD LETTUCE ON SALE VERY SOON

BOTH NORTHERN AND FLORIDA VARIETIES EXPECTED BY END OF WEEK.

CALIFORNIA GROWN HEADS TO BE HERE LITTLE LATER

As Supply Increases Price Will Go Down—Sweet Potatoes Now on Market Are Nicest of Season—Price Lower Than Formerly—Without Sugar, Cranberries Drug on Market.

The housewife will welcome the arrival of the head lettuce season which is promised for the end of the week. From then on thru the winter she will be able to procure head lettuce for the many delectable salads which are so nice at this season of the year, or for the garnishment of other foods. The supply which is to come Saturday will be very nice. It is shipped from Duluth and Florida, but that from the north is really the nicer. The northern heads are a little larger and almost as solid as a head of cabbage. They are to be 20 and 25 cents each. Iceberg head lettuce from California is the finest variety there is, but it is a little early yet for it to be had. When it arrives the housewife can easily tell the variety, for the heads are more solid, the leaves more crisp and the taste sweeter than any other kind. The bitter taste so often found in some varieties never is present in the Iceberg.

The first supply to arrive probably will not be very large, but as the season comes on the supply will soon become normal. The increasing supply will then lower the price.

Sweet Potatoes Now Best.
Sweet potatoes now on the market are the nicest of the season and cheaper than they have been at any time. The Jersey sweet potato is the sweetest and driest, but is very hard to get, so the Virginia, which is almost the same quality, is proving quite as popular a seller. They are very plentiful on the market and are selling at 25 cents for four to six pounds.

Cranberries are a drug on the market, not because of cheapness, but because of a large supply and the shortage of sugar to use with them. Just now the city practically is without sugar.

"Girls of the U. S. A." Present High Class Musical Burlesque.

Musical burlesque, with all the virtues of more pretentious musical comedy and none of the objectionable features of old vintage burlesque, was presented to a large audience Thursday night at the Odeon, by Joe Hurtig's "Girls of the U. S. A." The offering was the biggest and best burlesque performance seen locally in several years. Lavishly staged, handsomely costumed and presented with a large company of capable burlesquers the attraction was in many respects more worthy than many musical comedy productions which command \$2 a seat.

MARY PICKFORD IS COMING TO STRAND

Mae Tines, one of the most critical and outspoken of the metropolitan critics has this to say in the Chicago Tribune of September 20, relative to Mary Pickford's latest feature, "The Hoodlum."

Under the heading, "Miss Pickford proves that she can be a funny girl," Miss Tines says:

"The waters engulf her; the coal bin swallows her up—but her curls curl on forever. That's Mary Pickford in "The Hoodlum," a strange story of the granddaughter of Alexander Cuthrie. You might label the title, "From Silk to Slums" and have a perfectly good cognomen. But "The Hoodlum" is all right—and some hoodlum our Mary makes.

"There will always be controversy as to whether or not Miss Pickford is a great actress. I think 'Stella Maria' proved her one. Many insist, however, that her 'pull' is due to her sweetness. Great actress or not she can be a splendid entertainer and in her present release she's awfully funny.

"As the heroine of the story, she is granddaughter of a rich and eccentric old gentleman who adores her. Both have tempers and their clashes furnish the life in an otherwise most decorous household. Amy's mother is dead. Her father is a writer, whom she seldom sees.

"He emerges on the scene of action just when Amy is about to leave for Europe with her grandfather. Father is about to establish a residence in the slums, so that he may get first-hand knowledge for a new book. Amy is determined to go with him. And go she does and becomes like the rest of the strange population of Craigin street until brought back into her own by a series of events furnishing the plot for the picture.

"The plot? A good one. Action? Oodles of it. Comedy? Plenty. Fine acting, lighting, direction and photography to boot.

"Just see if you don't think Miss Pickford scores as a comedienne."
