WANTS MONEY BACK

PLAINTIFF IN COURT ACTION
ASKS CANCELLATION.

Elvis S. Lyuk Charges C. H. Swallow & Co., of Lincoln, Neb., With Obtaining Money and Notes in Land Deal—Administrator of Plantz Estate Seeks Execution on Judgment.

Charging that the defendant corporation induced him to execute promissory notes amounting to \$5,960, Elvis Seymour Lyuk has filed suit in district court against C. H. Swallow & Co., of Lincoln, Neb., and C. W. Elliott, fiscal agent and financial manager of the company, to have the notes delivered to the clerk of the courts to be cancelled and asking judgment for \$1,060, money paid to the company, and interest. The notes were given in part payment for Texas land, which Lyuk alleges is without any great value.

Five notes, maturing at various dates from ten days after the notes were executed, on June 28, to Nov. 1, 1920, at 6 per cent interest, were received by the corporation, it is alleged, in the claimed sale to the plaintiff of forty acres of land in Hidalgo county, Texas. The purchase price was \$11,560, it being the plan to have the plaintiff execute vendor's liens notes for the amount not covered by the notes and a small cash payment.

Lyuk Paid Company \$1,060. Lyuk alleges in his petition that he paid \$100 to the agent of the company at the time the contract was made for the transfer of the land, and that he has since paid \$960, the amount of the first note. All he has to show for his money and notes, he avers, is a contract for the land.

The land, he alleges, proves to be of little value, according to Lyuk's petition, and he claims to have tendered the contract to the company's agent and demanded the return of his notes. Cancellation of the notes now is sought, together with judgment against the defendant corporation for \$1,060 the amount paid, with interest.

Seeks Execution of Judgment. Seeking execution of a judgment for \$2,900, Victor Plantz, administrator of the estate of Fred Plantz, has filed suit against Fred L. Ward and Miss Mary Kreutzer. Fred Plantz was injured when a team he was driving started up quickly and ran thru a driveway door in the Kreutzer & Wasson lumber shed. Plantz struck the edge of the opening and was knocked from the wagon. He brought suit for personal injury and was given a verdict for \$3,058. The company appealed the case to the supreme court and the case was reversed. On re-trial in district court in April a judgment for \$2,900 was rendered and again an appeal was taken by Kreutzer & Wasson, but bond has not as yet been posted.

The execution on the judgment of \$2,900, against Miss Mary Kreutzer, of the firm of Kreutzer & Wasson, was returned unsatisfied, according to the petition in the new action, because no property was found.

It is alleged, in the petition, that Miss Kreutzer is possessed of property subject to execution far in excess of the amount of the judgment; that she has an interest in the lumber business conducted by Fred L. Ward, and that the name of Ward is used to conceal

the Kreutzer interest from the plaintiff. Plantz asks for an inquiry as to the interests of Miss Kreutzer in the lumber business conducted by Ward, and that she and Ward be subjected to an examination in court for the purpose of ascertaining such assets. It is asked that a lien upon real and personal property and the Ward lumber business be established and that execution issue to sell the property or otherwise enforce payment of the judgment.

RHODES PIONEER DEAD.

Joseph Moore Succumbs Following Long Illness. Joseph E. Moore, aged 50, and for fifty-five years a resident of Rhodes and vicinity, died at his home in Rhodes Sunday with the effects of a stroke of paralysis with which he was stricken Jan. 8, 1906 while staying at the home of his son, Willis Moore, at Bowdon, N. D.

Mr. Moore was a native of Bath, Maine, where he was born Aug. 27, 1829. December 22, 1862 he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Catherine Cunningham, in Oregon, Ill. In 1864 Mr. and Mrs. Moore came from Oregon, Ill. to the farm now occupied by Charles E. Haddock, west of Rhodes. At the time that part of Rhodes, outside of the plat of Edenville, and the country to the west was a veritable wilderness. The trading point was at Iowa Center now a few miles north and west of Maxwell.

Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Moore, two of whom survive their father. A daughter, Mrs. W. F. Smith, lives at Rhodes and a son, Charles G. Moore, lives in Canby, Ore. The other son, Willis E. Moore died at Rhodes Jan. 12, 1912.

Funeral services were held this afternoon from the Methodist church at Rhodes in charge of the pastor, Rev. R. E. J. Thompson. Interment was in Eden cemetery.

RESTORE M. & ST. L. TRAINS.

Service on Main Line and Branches to Be Normal After Thursday.

After Thursday of this week service on the main line and branches of the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railroad will be back to normal. Word received from Headquarters today by Trainmaster E. R. Kerwin announced that No. 6 would leave Minneapolis on the evening of Wednesday, Dec. 17, for its St. Louis connection with the Wabash at Albia. The Wabash will run a train out of St. Louis on the afternoon of Thursday, the 18th, so that the Minneapolis train on the M. & St. L. may go north Friday morning, the 19th.

No. 19 and 20, between Oskaloosa and Peoria, will be placed back into service on the 18th. These trains have a connection with Nos. 5 and 6 at Oskaloosa.

It recalls to Mrs. Mary G. Bradbury, 112 North Third street, that she, also, marketed eggs one time. It was during civil war times, when Mrs. Bradbury was quite a small girl. She was allowed the egg money and she remembers that one time she marketed fifty-three dozen at one time, but she did not receive 72 cents a dozen for them.
