CLAIMS \$25,000 IN INJURY SUIT

MRS. L. M. SWANN FILES ACTION AGAINST C. G. W. FOR HUSBAND'S DEATH.

ALLEGES HE WAS CRUSHED BY EMPLOYEES' NEGLIGENCE

Death of W. M. Swann, Former Foreman of C. G. W. Switching Crew, Made Basis for Action—Dead World War Soldier Left \$6,339 Estate—Other Actions Filed.

Claiming damages in the sum of \$25,000, Mrs. L. M. Swann, of this city, administratrix of the estate of her husband, W. M. Swann, who, before he was killed in the local yards of the Chicago Great Western, was foreman of the switching crew, has filed suit against Walter D. Hines, director general of railroads and the Chicago Great Western. Mr. Swann was killed Nov. 15, 1918, when he was caught between the swinging door of a refrigerator car and the side of building and was crushed.

It is alleged in the petition filed for Mrs. Swann, that the total accident was the result of negligence on the part of employees of the company, who failed to close and fastened the car door. It is averred that Swann went between the building and the car to fastened the door when he was caught and crushed.

Left Estate of \$6,339.
An estate of a net value of \$6,339.92 was left by Raymond W. Hall, of Minerva township, soldier, who died in the service, according to a petition filed by Joseph H. Hall, administratrix of the estate. The petition is filed against E. H. Hoyt, treasurer of state, to recover \$12.50, which it is alleged was overpaid in paying the collateral inheritance tax. The petition sets out that the gross value of the property of the estate was \$9,184.29 and after deducting debts and the costs of administration \$6,239.92 was left to be divided equally between the widow and sister of the decedent, the beneficiaries under the will.

Divorce and Other Suits.
O. E. Riland, owner of eighty acres of land on the boundary line between Marshall and Hamilton counties, has filed suit against both counties, by which he wants title established to a strip of land along the north side of his farm. It is alleged that the strip has been used for road purposes without ever having been dedicated for such use and that the land used is not a public highway.

The Garwin State Bank has filed suit against R. A. Lage and Mrs. Ella Lage to collect on a promissory note for \$300.

Mrs. Fern S. Martin has filed application for divorce from Charles D. Martin. The couple was married in Oskaloosa Aug. 12, 1917. The petitioner asks to be awarded the custody of a minor child and \$25 a month for its support.

John Lang has filed suit for divorce from Mrs. Mary Lang. They were married at Austin, Minn., April 2, 1915, the petition says.

Mrs. Nellie Morden, formerly of this city, but now of Chicago, has filed action for divorce from Walter Morden. They were married here Dec. 11, 1916.

Mrs. Diantha James is plaintiff in an action for divorce from Edgar C. James. The petition says they were married here Sept. 2, 1912, and lived together only until Oct. 1 of the same year. She was Diantha Warring before her marriage and asks the court to restore her maiden name.




