Police in Chicago have been notified and are searching for a young man, believed to have been the lover of the Mason City woman.

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

of conferring with those officials. The result was a bill drawn up by that bureau expressly for this state. The bill was received here just before Christmas.

The chief purpose of a new vital statistics law, according to Dr. Sumner, is to make Iowa's laws on that subject uniform with those of other states; and furthermore, by having a law in accord with federal requirements, to bring Iowa into the United States registration area.

This bill proposes that the secretary of the state board of health make the state registrar of vital statistics, and requires that vital statistics be reported by townships rather than counties as units. It provides for the immediate registration of all births and deaths throughout the state of Iowa by means of certificates of births and deaths, and burial or removal permits; to require prompt returns to the bureau of vital statistics at the capitol of the state, as required by established by the state registrar of vital statistics; to insure thorough organization and efficiency of the registration of vital statistics throughout the state; to provide certain penalties; to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith.

The bill goes on to provide "that the secretary of the state board of health shall be the state registrar of vital statistics and shall have charge of the registration of births and deaths; shall prepare the necessary instructions, forms and blanks for obtaining and preserving such records and shall procure the faithful registration of the same in each primary registration district, and in the central bureau of vital statistics the capitol of the state. The state registrar shall be charged with the uniform and thorough enforcement of the law through the state, and shall from time to time recommend additional legislation that may be necessary."

Des Moines seeks to have him removed from Street Car Case.

Des Moines, Dec. 29.—Charles "Personal bias and prejudice" in the conduct of the gas case, Mayor Burton yesterday filed application with the Federal Judge Martin W. Wade to be removed from jurisdiction.

The petition was filed in federal court Wednesday.

It asks that the circuit court appoint the judge of another district to hear the case.

Should the application be granted, Judge Wade would be barred from further jurisdiction in both the gas and street car controversies.

The application is accompanied by an affidavit signed by Mayor Burton.

When Judge Charles Hutchinson and Solicitor Reson Jones appeared at the recent hearing on this case, says the affidavit, and objected to Judge Wade's jurisdiction, "Judge Wade, with impatience and in an angry tone criticized the city for making objections, and treated counsel as tho they were committing some offense in appearing and making objection to the court's power to proceed.

The court said at the time was not taken down, and therefore "his exact language cannot be given, but it was not only what he said, but the manner in which he said it, which indicated bias and prejudice against the city and its representatives."

Rockwell School Head to Leave.

Rockwell, Dec. 30.—R. J. Still, for the past four years superintendent of the public schools here, has resigned to take a position at the capitol and was considered one of the country's able pedagogues.

His place will be taken temporarily by Miss Jessie Pierson, who has been instructor in Latin and history.

Oliver Moore, assistant manual training instructor, will take over the manual training department of the Rockwell schools, formerly under charge of Mr. Still.

Mail Jobs For Soldiers' Wives.

Des Moines, Dec. 30.—Married women entitled to military preference or the wives of soldiers, sailors or marines now in the service will be given an opportunity to work in examinations Jan. 15, for positions as railway mail clerks. No other women are eligible.

Women who pass will not be stationed on railway mail cars but will be employed in terminal service, a limited number of these positions being available. The starting salary is \$1,600 a year.

Examinations will be held at Des Moines and twenty-one other Iowa cities.

Fortune in Booze Taken at Waterloo

Whisky Runners With Truck Load of Liquors Valued at \$20,000 Captured After Exciting Chase—Largest Capture of Kind in Experience of Officers.

Waterloo, Dec. 30.—After an exciting chase of half an hour, commencing at 1 a. m. today Sgt. Ed L. Douglas and Officer James Lammett port to cover a new Red truck transporting 200 gallons of whisky. Two men driving the truck abandoned their high-priced cargo before police officers could overhual them. They were captured later.

It was estimated that the contraband captured by police officers is worth approximately \$20,000, according to prevailing bootleg prices. The catch is the largest of its kind ever made in the history of Waterloo police department and is believed to have few equals in the state.

Shortly after 1 a. m., two young men from Waverly entered police headquarters and informed Captain William C. Farley that two men with a Red truck and twenty ten-gallon cans of whisky got stuck in a snow bank three miles this side of Waverly at 4 p. m. yesterday. Another party came along and pulled the booze cargo out.

The two young men giving Captain Farley the information came upon the party just after the latter had been hauled out upon the road. The Jew and his companion headed back toward Waterloo and the Waverly youths, who were in an old Ford trailer they to see where they went.

When questioned by the police one of the men acknowledged his name to be Joseph Posner, his age to be 30 years and that he was an American Jew. He gave his address as 1177 Washington Boulevard, Chicago. He had a suit case containing extra suit, overcoat and other wearing apparel.

The other man gave his name as John Huns, his age as 33 years and his home 648 Edmund street, St. Paul. He had traveling bag containing a complete opium outfit with necessary dope. Both men deny ownership of the car or contents and denied knowledge of the other truck claiming they left their car in the road for seven or eight hours.

After locating the "booze car" Sergeant Douglas returned to headquarters leaving Officer Lammett in charge. In expectation of the booze runners return, about thirty minutes later they did return and Lammett apprehended them at the point of his gun. Later they were taken to the police station and the Red car and its contents were also brot in. It contained eighteen full and two empty ten gallon cans.
