CREATE TWO NEW ROAD DISTRICTS

PETITIONS OF RESIDENTS OF NORTHERN END OF COUNTY ACTED ON.

DISTRICTS ESTABLISHED THAT ROADS MAY BE GRAVELED

First District is That of Union-Stanford-Liscomb Road; Second Embraces Albion-Liscomb Road—Board Now to Let Contract and Name Board of Apportionment.

The petitions of farm owners of the north-central portion of the county for the establishment of two secondary road districts were favorably acted on Thursday afternoon by the county board of supervisors. The new districts, known as Nos. 1 and 2, are located in Liscomb, Bangor and Iowa townships. The first, known as the Union-Stanford-Liscomb road, runs west and north from Liscomb to the county line, a distance of about six and a half miles, and No. 2, is the Albion-Liscomb road, approximately five miles in length along the M. & St. L. right-of-way.

The resolution provides that the districts be established, that the designation of the districts shall be secondary road districts Nos. 1 and 2, and that provision be made for graveled roads.

Designation of New Districts.

Officially, the boundaries of district No. 1 are described as commencing at the northwest corner of the northeast quarter of section 4, township 88, range 19, thence south along the line of the county road already established along the middle north and south line of sections 4 and 9, to the center point of section 9, and thence east along the line of the county road already established along the middle east and west line of sections 9, 10, 11 and 12, to the northeast corner of the northwest quarter, section 12, at the west line of the corporate limits of the town of Liscomb.

District No. 2 is designated as beginning at the south limits of the town of Liscomb and thence south approximately five miles to the north limits of the town of Albion. This road has long been known as the "state" road.

To Name Apportionment Board.

Now that the districts have been established the county board will name a board of apportionment, consisting of three resident freeholders of the county, who shall apportion all special benefits to the real estate within the districts. No one living in or owning land in these districts may be appointed to the board. Prior to the naming of this board, the contract for the work of improvement will be let, but the board did not, at its meeting Thursday, set any time for receiving bids.

Seventy-five per cent of the expense of the improvement shall be borne by the county and the other 25 per cent shall be paid by the property owners who receive benefits from the improvements.

REGISTER 3,635 CARS.

More Than Half of Autos of County Licensed at Noon.

Shortly before noon today 2,635 automobiles had been licensed for 1921 in Marshall county. This is considerably more than half the cars owned in the county. It was expected that the 4,000 mark would be reached by night. After the close of today's business auto owners who have not secured licenses will become delinquent. There were about 450 cars registered Thursday and it was expected an even greater number would be licensed today.

DUNHAM MAY DIE

Dunbar Farmer, Accidentally Wounded By Shot Gun, in Serious Condition With Slight Chance of Recovery—Lung Complication Develops—Condition Not Hopeless.

James Dunham, the young farmer living two miles southeast of Dunbar, who was seriously wounded when he accidentally knocked over a shot gun at his home, was in a critical condition today Dr. A. J. Bryant, of Montour, the attending physician, said. Dr. Bryant described Dunham's condition as critical but not hopeless.

The wounded man's lungs have become affected and his heart has begun to show the strain of the shock. The doctor was hopeful that Dunham's youth, strength and hardy constitution would, perhaps, pull him thru.

LAST DAY OF FILING.

New Actions for January Term of Court Are Begun.

Today was the last day for filing cases for the January term of the district court. Many new petitions were filed today, including two suits for divorce. One of these was filed by Mrs. Helen Hickenlooper, of this city, vs. Frank Hickenlooper, in which she asks the custody of two children, Miller, aged 12, and Margaret, aged 10. Mr. and Mrs. Hickenlooper were married at Cedar Rapids, Oct. 2, 1907.

The other shows Mrs. Lizzie E. Ladd as plaintiff and Frank B. Ladd, defendant. Mrs. Ladd asks the custody of the sum of \$1,000 and \$100 a month for support of herself and children; a writ of attachment on property of the defendant to the amount of \$1,000, and a restraining order to enjoin the defendant from disposing of goods or furniture from any property of the plaintiff or her children. Mr. and Mrs. Ladd were married at Pleasant Ridge, Dec. 19, 1907.

Asking \$3,000 on three promissory notes, the Emmet County Bank is plaintiff in a suit against Mundy & Scott, et al. The notes, executed in 1917, are for \$1,000, \$200 and \$200, respectively, two being given to E. K. Jackson and the third to W. E. Brooks, and assigned to the plaintiff bank.

H. Halverson has started suit against the Northwestern asking judgment for \$300, claimed as damages for being ousted from land and a building near the LeGrand station, leased by the plaintiff from the railroad company for one year. It is alleged a written contract for the rental of the property was entered into Feb. 13, and that May 1, the railroad company took possession, after the rental had been paid.

Adam Amendt is plaintiff in a suit filed against Ered E. and Aiveno E. Otte, in which judgment is sought on two notes, one for \$3,286.04, the other for \$5,196.55. The first was given to T. J. Shoenberger, March 12, 1914, according to the petition, but later was assigned to the First Trust & Savings Bank, then to the First National Bank, and finally to the plaintiff. The second note was made payable to the plaintiff, and was executed May 16, 1918. The foreclosure of a mortgage on lot 2, block 4, Webster's second addition, is asked.

Suit also was filed by Julia Beveridge vs. Jessie E. Flanagan and others, in which the plaintiff seeks to confirm title to an undivided one-third of the east forty-five feet of the west two-thirds of lot 9, block 19, original town of Marshall.
