HEALTH HINTS.

The Jews are a wonderful people. They are getting the people to settle in neighborhoods, so that their interests may be better looked after; the poor are to be relieved, the backward helped and honor instilled into the dealings of all. Instead of attempting to defend Jews who may be accused of crime they are going to look up the record of the suspect; if his record be bad, they, instead of defending him, are going to see that they are put away for safe keeping a long time. Eudell are living in the west part of the city and own valuable property and Mr. L. Adams is also doing well. Mr. C. Britton is succeeding nicely. Rev. Stansbury has charge of the only church, which is the A. M. E. church, here. We next stopped in Peoria, Ill. Being compelled to work in the rain, we did not observe as much as we ordinarily would. Then the Ringling Bros. show was to contend with, and our collections were not as good as any reasonable person would expect. I guess they were saving up for the show and did not want to pay their just debts. Our old friend and ex-editor, Charles Ruff, lives here and he was well. He is not working on the linotype at present. Mr. E. Harper had gone as captain of the Peoria company. His wife, who was looking after his pantatorium business, is sick and in the hospital, undergoing an operation. H. F. Johnson, the veteran mail carrier, is still on the force, looking as young as ever. Mrs. F. Sumner has moved to Hancock street and is running a rooming house. Mrs. A. Here we found our old friend, W. Fields, in the grocery business, doing as well as usual. He formerly lived in Keokuk, Iowa. W. I. Willis is in the ice business and is doing nicely. He enjoys a large trade, and our friend, Rev. T. L. Smith, still pastors the large Baptist church. He formerly lived in Keokuk. He and his wife have added some very important repairs to the church.
