INJUNCTION AN ENSLAVER

Gompers Makes Comment Upon Method Used Temporarily to Stop Local Strike.

HE DENOUNCES THE PLAN

Says Purpose is to Tie Laborers— "When Man is Compelled by Edict of Judge to Work, Slavery is Established."

Washington, D. C., Aug. 8.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in discussing yesterday the injunction which has temporarily broken the street car strike in Des Moines, Ia., said:

"The judge's order is simply the logical result of an illogical premise. It is the natural development of the unnatural abuse of the injunction. The whole policy of the species of injunction has been to tie the men of labor to their work and to make ineffectual any effort to secure improvement in the condition of the worker or effectually to protest against the deterioration in the conditions of the workers.

"That has been the purpose and the policy of the judges who have issued the injunctions against workmen engaged in a dispute with employers, injunctions which never would have been issued against other citizens or even against the same workmen were they not engaged in a labor dispute with employers. The purpose and policy is to tie the workmen to their work. In other words, to bring them into a condition of slavery.

"When a man is compelled to work under conditions which are onerous to him, which he regards as unjust, say because of insufficient compensation or return for labor performed," continued the labor leader, "and he is compelled by the edict of a judge to work against his will or to suffer, or to go to prison, for his failure to abide by the order of the court to work, that moment slavery has been established."

Starving Men Rescued.

Valdez, Alaska, Aug. 8.—Attracted by signals of distress from Bardwell island, a barren rock near the entrance to Resurrection bay, the steamship Bertha, on Aug. 2, sent out a small boat and took off two ragged and starving men, Charles Alexander and Alvin Anderson. The men had been on the island for two months and would have perished but for the coming of the Bertha.

The men sailed from Kodiak, May 11, in a dory on a prospecting voyage. About June 1 a storm upset their craft off Bardwell island and their provisions and outfit were lost in the sea. They managed to get ashore, but practically with nothing but their clothing.

The men, who had a few matches, living for a month on mussels, clams, young gulls, seaweed and wild herbs, which they cooked. After their matches gave out, about July 1, they ate their food raw. Two vessels passed without noticing their signals of distress.
