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HOG KING ON WAY TO FAIR

Grand Champion Iowa Boar Will be "Among Those Present" at County Fair Here.

WORTH ABOVE \$25,000

Three Ball Games With County Teams Also Announced as Attractions.

Ever see \$25,000 worth of pork all in one piece?

Well, you'll have the chance tomorrow on the opening day of the big Hamilton county fair at the new grounds on the east side. G. O. Satre of Stanhope is bringing his prize Duroc Jersey boar, Giant Wonder I Am, up to give to Hamilton county people a chance to see what a real porcine king looks like. This boar won out as senior champion and grand champion at the state fair in Des Moines last week in the largest display of hogs ever made at an Iowa fair. His owner has refused \$25,000 for him.

Big Hog Show.
This wonder boar will attract a good deal of attention at the Hamilton county fair. There will probably be some four hundred hogs entered here, however, by noon tomorrow, so that the hog exhibit will be the big part of the live stock show at the fair.

Ball Games.
Beginning Wednesday afternoon, there will be a ball game each afternoon for three days. The Webster City Nationals and Webster City Athletics will play the first afternoon. Thursday afternoon Ellsworth and the Nationals will play and on Friday afternoon the Nationals and Stanhope will cross bats. These ball games are expected to draw large crowds from over the county. A new diamond has been "skinned" off on the fair ground and no admission will be charged to the games. They are free to all persons on the grounds.
