## Jettings About the County.

### The Mark Wilson Highway.

Jewell Record: W. C. Wood, of Fort Dodge, of the National Highway Markers association, was in town Tuesday forenoon, conferring with the secretary of the Wilson Highway regarding the marking of the highway entirely across the state, work on which is to be started early next spring and pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. The National Highway Markers association were to have done that the past year, but shortage of materials and labor made it impossible for them to take care of such work on all of the registered highways which they had arranged to mark, and other highways had claims prior to that of the Wilson.

Jewell Record: Rev. G. A. McKinley, of Pierre, S. D., who was here a few weeks ago to hold Sunday services at the Federated church, has accepted a call to the pastorate here. He will arrive in Jewell to assume his duties immediately after the first of the year.

### Reward to Find Mrs. Fallein.

Stratford Courier: The continued absence of Mrs. Hannah Fallein is causing the children and other relatives the greatest concern. The Des Moines papers have published pictures of the missing woman and relatives have offered a reward for information as to her whereabouts, so far without result. It is feared that she may have met with foul play or that while temporarily deranged she went to some distant city and having not recovered her faculties cannot tell whom she is. The amount of money she carried with her cannot last long and she carried no baggage of any kind so far as is known. So far her disappearance is shrouded in mystery as no trace has been found of her since she left a department store in Des Moines where she did some trading and cashed a check for \$357.

### A Narrow Escape.

Williams Enterprise: C. H. Harrington narrowly escaped death Wednesday morning when the fast train going west struck his team while crossing the track at the Wagner crossing. Mr. Harrington was returning home from town in a surrey, and failed to clear the train coming until the team was already on the track. The animals became frightened and one of them being a colt it was impossible to get them off the track before the train struck them. Both animals were instantly killed, one being cut in two near the shoulders and thrown some twenty feet from the crossing. The carriage was turned over and Mr. Harrington pinned under it, receiving only a few scratches. Mr. Harrington feels very fortunate that he escaped so luckily.

### Near Serious Affair.

Jewell Record: An incident that bordered closely on the possibly serious occurred at the Federated church last Sunday evening.

During the evening preaching service a noise was heard in the basement, but nobody paid attention to it, thinking that it was a shovel falling down or something of the sort. But after the service it happened that A. L. Fleenor was one of the last to leave the church and he happened to notice, just as he was about to go, that the church janitor, Martin Larson, had not come up from the basement to turn out the lights, and so decided to investigate.

Going to the basement he found Mr. Larson lying flat on his back in the doorway between the fuel room and the furnace room, and unable to get up. He had attempted to sit down on a folding chair and the chair collapsed letting him fall to the floor. Mr. Larson, who suffered a paralytic stroke some time ago and is quite feeble, was not able to get up and had been lying on the floor for more than a half hour when discovered by Mr. Fleenor. It was indeed quite fortunate that Mr. Fleenor thought to investigate or Mr. Larson might have lain there for many hours. He was all right again after being helped up and appears to have suffered no ill effects from the incident.
