

STATE CHURCH MEETING HERE

Iowa Convention of Christian Churches Opens Here With Over 200 Delegates.

TO ELECT OFFICERS
Interesting Program Planned With Many Prominent Speakers.

The state convention of the Christian churches of Iowa opened in this city this afternoon in the local Christian church and will continue throughout Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. More than two hundred delegates from all parts of the state will be in attendance, and the speakers include prominent church men from various parts of the country.

State officers of the missionary society and of the convention for the coming year will be elected at this meeting, and sessions will be held each morning, afternoon and evening.

Among those who will appear on the program are W. M. Baker, Dr. F. D. Kershner and C. S. Medbury, all of Des Moines; Dr. Arthur Holmes, president of Drake University of Des Moines; H. L. Olmstead, of Omaha; Milo J. Smith and F. E. Smith, of Indianapolis, Ind.


