TRADE BETWEEN U. S. AND GREECE IS FALLING OFF

(By The Associated Press.) Athens, June 13.—America's commercial supremacy in Greece is threatened by England. Figures just compiled by Will L. Lowrie, of Elgin, Ill., American consul-general to Greece, show that during the first eight months of 1920 Great Britain's exports to Greece were valued at 10 per cent more than the exports of the United States.

In 1919 the United States held the record, leading England by a good margin. England also leads America in imports from Greece, American imports for the year fell off more than \$5,000,000.

SHRINERS POURING INTO DES MOINES TODAY

City of 10,000 Inhabitants has Been Created on Railroad Yards for Meetings.

LARGE DELEGATIONS Three Special Trains Carry Delegation From Chicago Temple.

(By The Associated Press.) Des Moines, Iowa, June 13.—Trainload after trainload of gaily uniformed Shriners poured into Des Moines today, and by tonight more than 50,000 red-fezzed Shriners and their wives and families, coming from all parts of the continent, will be in the city in readiness for the convening of the Forty-Seventh annual session of the Imperial Council, Ancient Arabic order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, tomorrow morning.

A city of ten thousand inhabitants, who are living in their Pullman coaches during the Des Moines meeting, has been created in the railroad yards, where 400 coaches are parked. Sidewalks have been built, electric light service installed, sanitary arrangements made and telephone service supplied to every car.

HATRED FOR FRENCH GROWS IN GERMANY
