### PONZI FACES 22 NEW INDICTMENTS RESULT FINANCIAL EXPLOITS

It was held today by the supreme court in an opinion delivered by Chief Justice Taft.

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### PREDICT BOOM FOR TRADE IN PHILIPPINES

Manila, P. I., March 27.—A decline of \$96,608,000 was registered in the domestic and foreign trade of the Philippine Islands during 1921, when the total trade of the islands was \$203,553,000, as compared with \$200,562,000 in 1920, according to figures just given out by the statistics division of the bureau of customs.

### GERMAN FIRM WINS CORNER IN LEATHER

### TESTS DISCLOSE APTITUDE ALONG MUSICAL LINES

Jones, director of the school of education, Northwestern University. The professors are directing experiments from time to time among several hundred children.

### GERMAN BOXERS FROM ENGLISH RING

### ENGINEERS DECIDE ON BRIDGE LOCATION
